CLAREMONT — Those who are shopping for antique raisin seeders, nursing rockers, autoharps and barber chairs, seek out little shops like one that started Saturday in Claremont.

Besides those unusual items, owner Jill Woolin reports that the shop also has Canadian glass, china, tools, and unfinished furniture.

"As soon as you start refinishing, the price really goes up," she explained. For that reason, the furniture is left "in the rough" for the buyers.

The Canadian glass, she said, are probably the most valuable antiques in the store. One goblet can cost up to \$25 apiece.

Most of the items are bought at auctions, Mrs. Woolin said. "people

really do go wild at auctions...In this vicinity you'd be very lucky if you got a bargain," she remarked. Mrs. Woolin believes the reason for the increase in the popularity of antiques is "nostalgia more than anything." She estimates that the age of most of her items is about 60 or 70 years old, although some of it ranges to 100 years or older.
