It takes the skins of no less than 40 otters to make one fur coat. These superb, attractive animals have been sacrificed in the tens of thousands simply to meet the demand of people in countries such as Canada for fur coats.

I hope everyone who feels the need to wear fur will, before purchasing a coat, first demand proof that the fur of the coat is either synthetic or, at the very worst, the fur is obtained from ranch animals.

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Board of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to discuss the following proposed Official Plan amendment whereby it is the intent of Council to:

"Consider proposed amendment no. 7 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from "Rural" to "Estate Residential" on the east part of Lot 14, Concession 5. The subject site consisting of 98.6 acres is located on the west side of the 6th Concession Road approximately one-quarter of a mile south of the Vandorf Sideroad. The purpose of the amendment is to permit a 30 lot "estate type" development."

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending document may be examined at the Clerk's Office, Municipal Building, Stouffville, during regular business hours.

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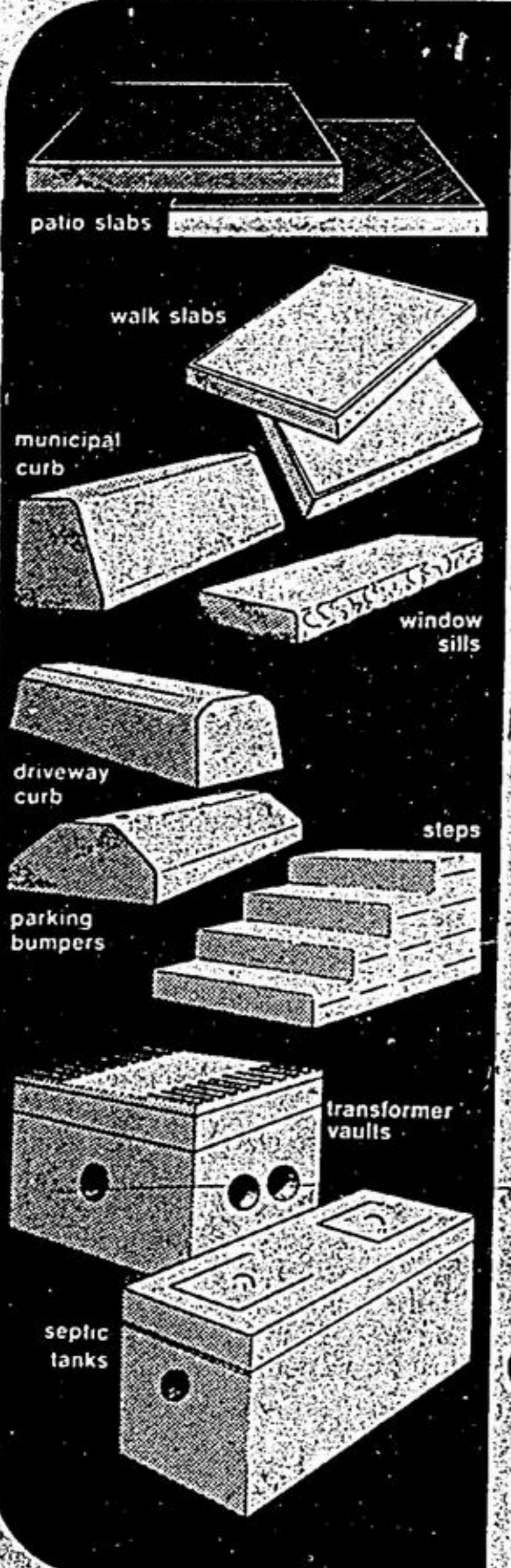
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
