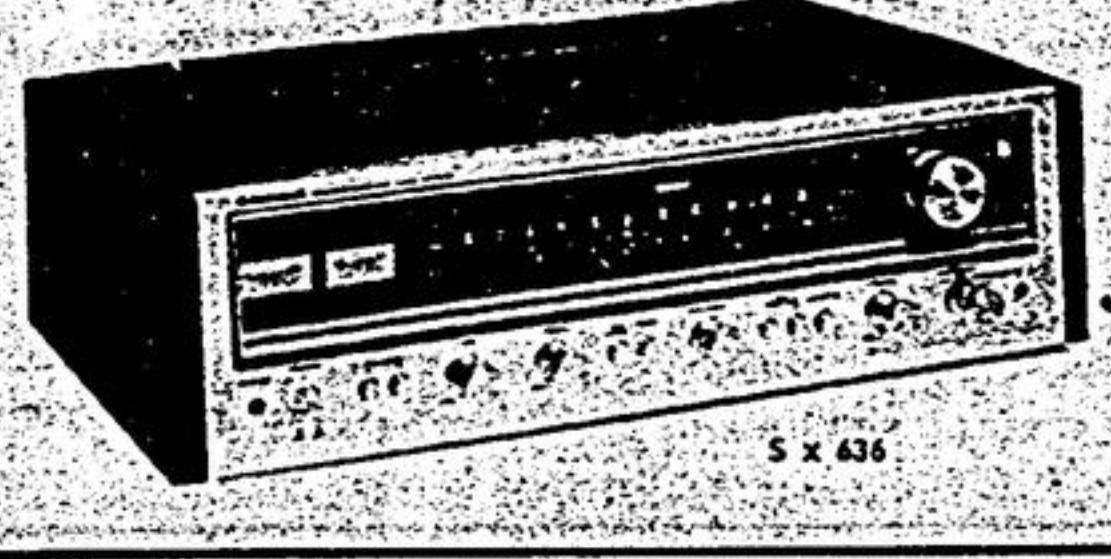

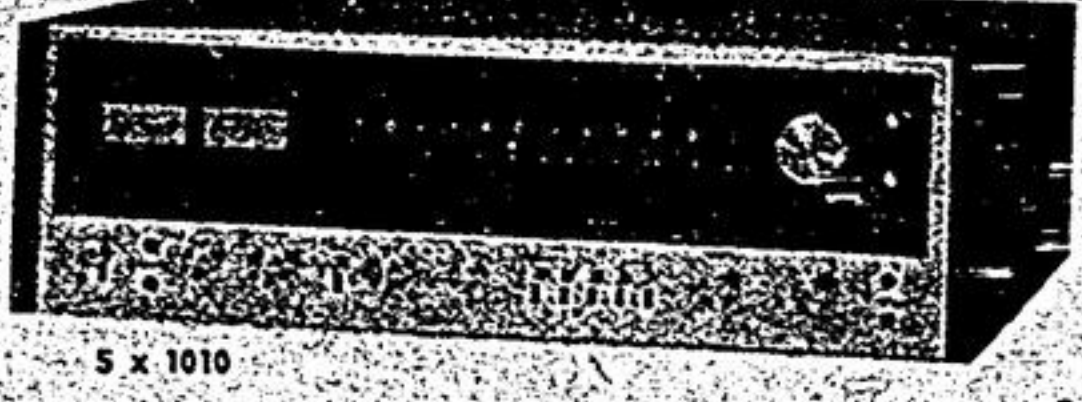

Lions Club wants action

STOUFFVILLE — If Dr. Bill Murphy, President of the Lion's Club, has his way Stouffville's 1977 centennial celebration will be something to remember.

Dr. Murphy, a lifelong Stouffville resident, has twice appeared before council, urging members to begin preparations immediately, by appointing a Centennial Committee.

He feels the committee should be formed before the upcoming municipal elections as he thinks the new council will be too busy preparing a budget and working

out difficulties, "until March." "One of the objectives for this year is to start taking action." "It takes a long time to organize and publicize this sort of thing," he said. "We should use the experience of Markham and Uxbridge for background. The Uxbridge centennial took planning two years in advance."

Dr. Murphy feels money could be raised for a centennial project if every local group held one event and donated the proceeds. He suggested the proceeds from the Lion's annual barbecue could go to the project.

Amendment needed for Vandorf proposal

VANDORF — Local developer Clayton Clouter is a man with many irons in the fire.

Mr. Clouter, who recently received regional approval for the 68 home second phase of Ballantrae's "Felray subdivision and received approval in principle from town council for a development to include 106 housing units on Bethesda Rd. has come before council with a third proposal. It was deferred.

Mr. Clouter asked for an official plan amendment to allow housing to be built on land presently designated industrial.

The site which according to Mr. Clouter is between 65 and 70 acres would be divided into two nearly equal sections. Half would be residential and the other half industrial.

The proposal calls for 55 houses on 20,000 square foot lots and is located on land owned by Ron Rice, part lots 17 and 18, concession 4, just north of the hamlet of Vandorf.

"The problem that you all recognize with getting good industry is the problem of finding workers," argued Mr. Clouter. "You need some houses to get industry going."

"The soil conditions are very good," he continue. "There is no problem with septic tanks or water supply. The water table is down a fair ways and there is no pollution problem."

Mr. Clouter was informed the development would necessitate a secondary plan for Vandorf.

"We are awaiting a study of the Vandorf area. We will know better what to do when we get that study," said Councillor Merlyn Baker.

Discussion on the matter has been deferred until council receives the study.
