



## Major effort to recycle garbage

Two recent Queen's Park announcements will have a major effect on the people of Vaughan, Richmond Hill and Markham. One is good and one is bad, and both involve our environment.

The good one is the decision to proceed with a major effort to recycle garbage. Although the first stage is merely at \$17 million shredding and sorting programme in 7 communities, that in itself will substantially reduce objectionable features of garbage — namely smell, rodents and bulk. The long range plan is to assume responsibility across the Province for garbage disposal and to undertake a construction programme over the next several years of up to \$400 million to construct plants to utilize waste through reclamation and conversion. 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**Humane Society posts huge rate increase**

**STOUFFVILLE** — The Ontario Humane Society has informed Whitby-Stouffville Council that if they wish to retain the same service from the society in 1975 as was provided in 1974 the cost per capita will jump from 80¢ to \$1.25.

That's a considerable jump, almost a 50 per cent hike," commented Councillor June Button.

"I don't think we have any alternative but to deal with the Humane Society," said Councillor Art Starr. Council had considered hiring their own personnel for canine control, but decided the cost would be prohibitive.

Councillor Cathy Joice was chosen to represent council at a joint meeting between the Humane Society and the other municipalities using the society's services. The meeting is being held to negotiate a

common fee for the three municipalities. Mrs. Joice will report back to council.

T. J. L. Hughes,

Executive Vice-President

of the Ontario Humane Society, sent council a letter informing them of the rate increases.

Mr. Hughes wrote,

"If we are to extend the service in 1975 to allow for one warden to be in each of the municipalities for at least eight hours per day, the cost to the municipalities will be \$1.60 per capita."

Mr. Hughes also

informed council that if they wished to hire their own wardens and use the society's pound facilities this could be arranged at a charge of 50 cents per capita per annum.

In preparing the budget for 1975 we have used a 12 per cent inflation factor, although this may well be, in fact, too little," Mr. Hughes wrote.

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
