

Two years probation for \$1,000 damage

NEWMARKET — Two Stouffville area youths were put on two years probation, after they pleaded guilty to charges of committing mischief.

Brett Cashman and Stephen Gunther, both 16, pleaded guilty when they appeared in Newmarket Provincial Court recently. Last week they were sentenced by Judge Carl Waisberg.

The two had originally been charged with break, enter and theft, but pleaded guilty to the lesser charge.

The two youths admitted to breaking into two Musselman's Lake cottages and, after finding a considerable quantity of beer, wrecking places. Photos of the damage were submitted in evidence by the police and estimates of the damage exceeded \$1,000.

Judge Waisberg told the youths they would have to make restitution for damages over the 24-month probation period.

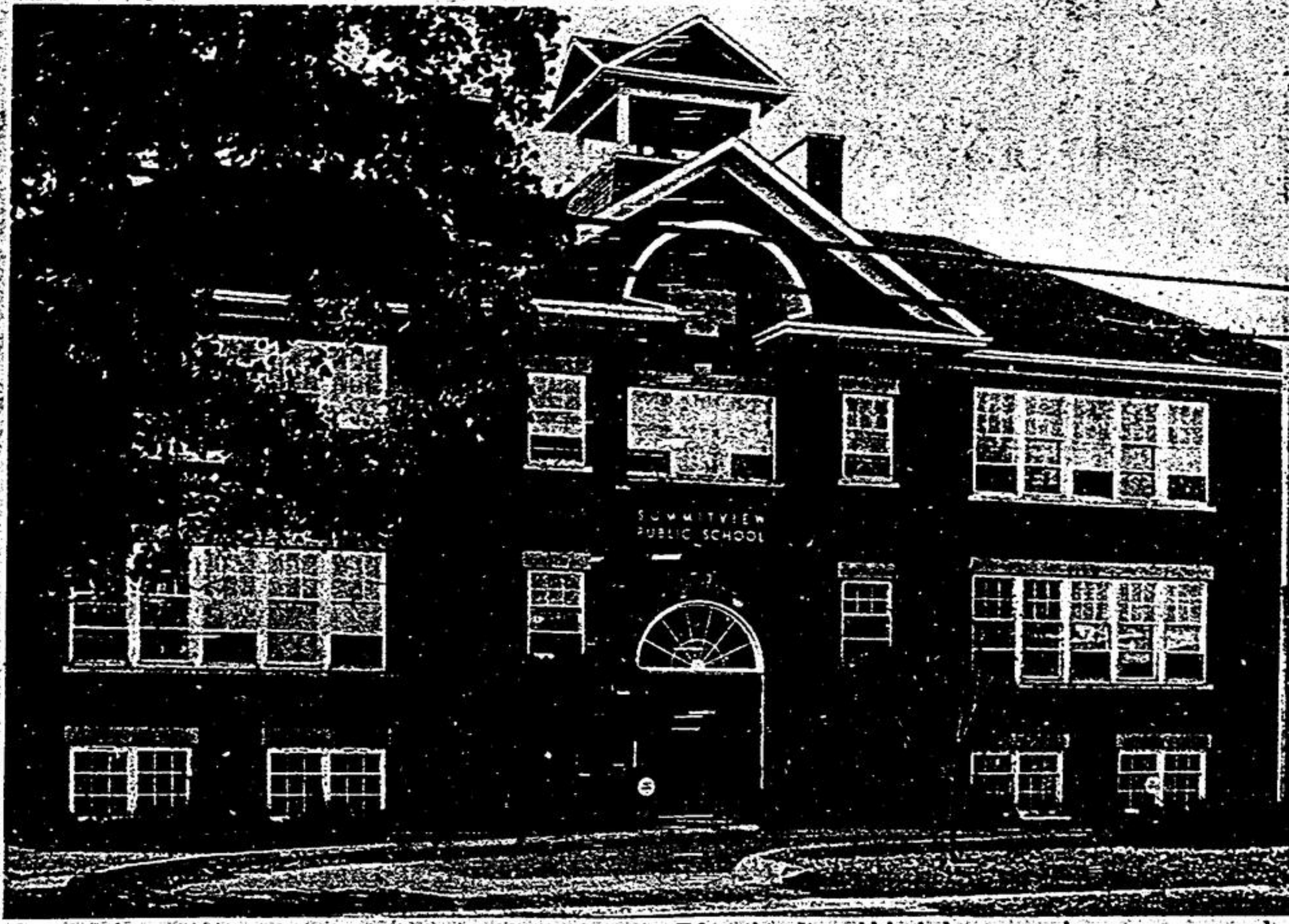

Comprehensive zoning by-law passed

STOUFFVILLE — By-law 72-7 has passed with two or three exceptions, Mayor Gordon Ratcliff told The Tribune last week.

The mayor called the by-law which consolidates the zoning by-laws of the former Village of Stouffville, the former Township of Whitchurch and the area formerly part of Markham, "the most comprehensive piece of legislation ever passed by this municipality."

The approval was granted following a recent Ontario Municipal Board Hearing. According to Mayor Ratcliff,

there will have to be another hearing on the Schickedanz proposal in Ballantrae. According to the official plan it is designated industrial but is zoned rural.

Question: Will council be contributing any financial support to the recycling depot?

"We will co-operate to the fullest to get them established. We are trying to find them a location and I feel we would pay the rent on it. That should give it a chance to prove itself. The operation could eventually become self-sustaining."

Question: Has any

action been taken to close Stouffville Trailer Sales Ltd. on Hwy 48 since council passed a resolution to close it?

"The Town Solicitor, Paul Mingay was to look into the legal end of that and report back to council. We haven't heard back from him yet. We just haven't gotten around to it yet with this garbage business. Lately its all been garbage, morning, noon and night."

Question: As the capacity is now used up for the sewage treatment plant, how long will it be before there is another extension?

"The engineering for the extension of the plant should be done this winter. The feeling is its going to take a few months to engineer out the design. I would say all of the next sewage plant extension, the water

tower and stream rechannelization will be paid for by the next large development. This could possibly be the Dulverton subdivision to the north. Until then there will be no small developments in the village. Only normal fillins would be allowed. More connections can be made to the existing pipe but no extension of the pipe will be allowed."

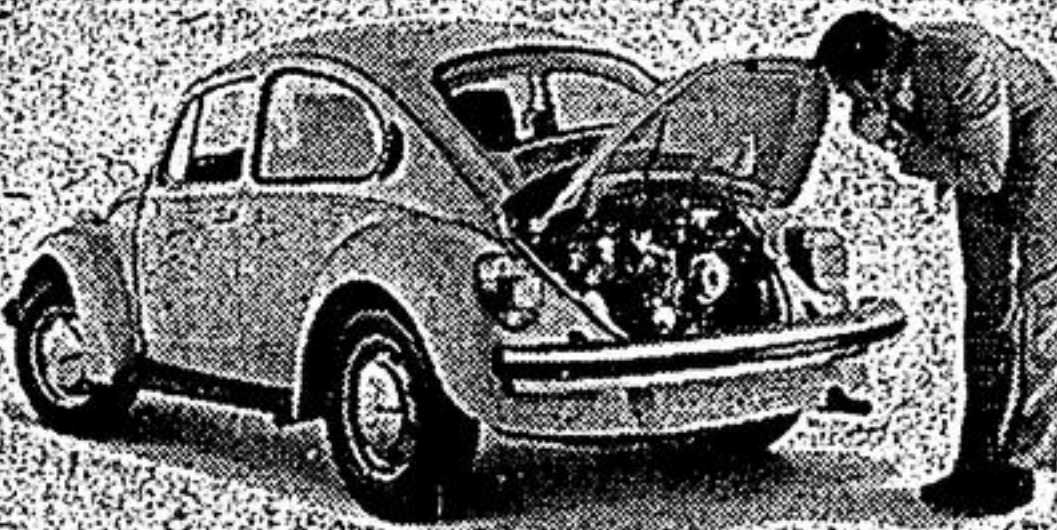

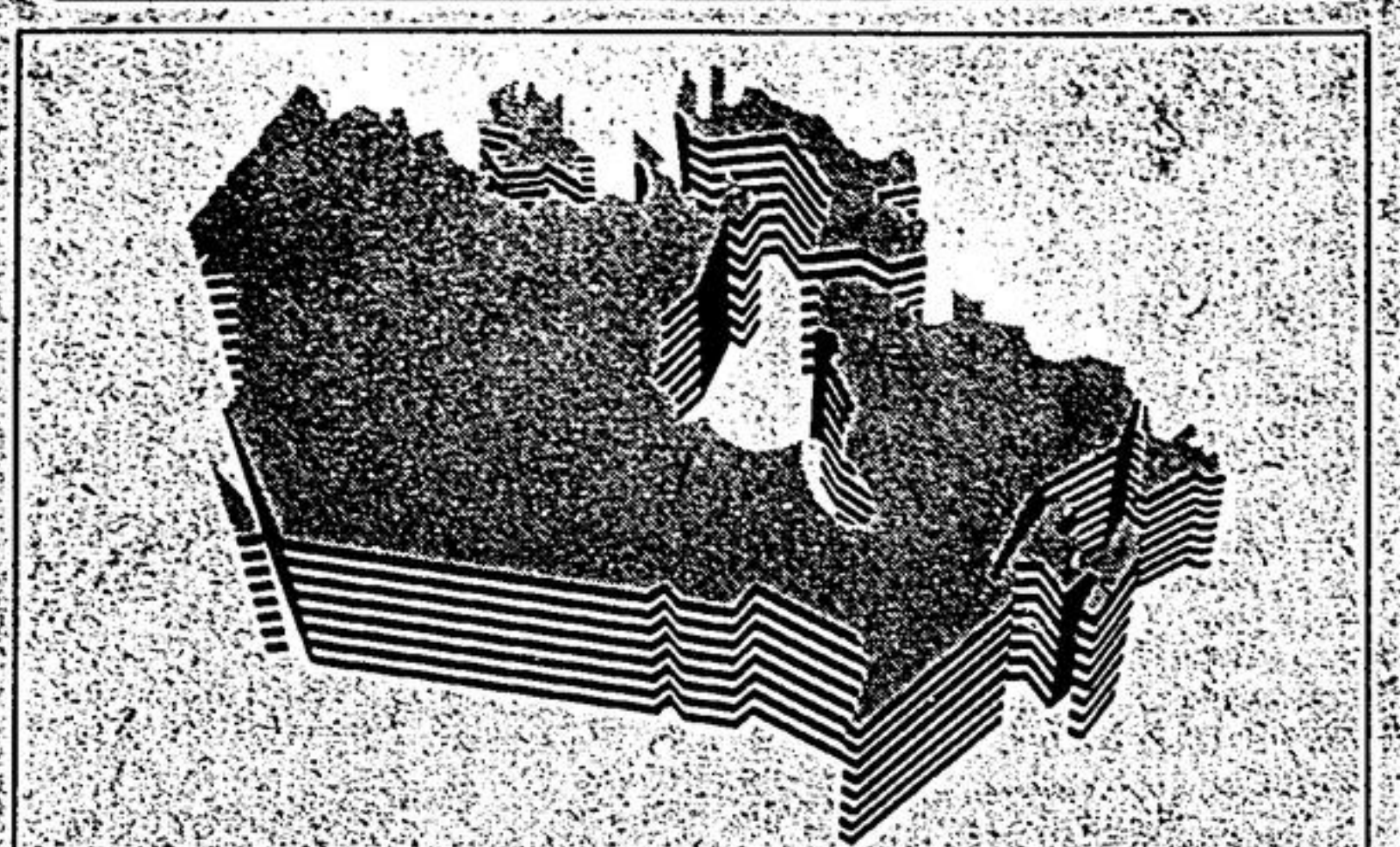
