Dynamic speaker for conference

GORMLEY — A dynamic and dedicated speaker, Dr. Eric Sisel, is the guest speaker for the Gormley Missionary Church Bible Conference next week.

Dr. Sisel will speak in the evening service Sunday that marks the church's 101st anniversary, then will speak for the next three successive evenings.

He was born in Paris, France and has a doctorate degree from the Sorbonne and the University of Vienna. For 10 years he worked as a reporter, then editor with the Toronto Telegram.

In 1966 in the midst of the Telegram newsroom, he experienced a profound spiritual crisis, and in response to a clear call of God, he resigned his position in the newspaper to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel.

He attended seminary and was ordained to the United Church ministry in 1969. He is the pastor at the Lake-of-Bays charge in Muskoka.

According to Evangelist Ken Campbell, Dr. Sisel, "ministers the Word with stirring fervor and to the spiritual edification of his hearers."
