D.I. Jeffrey

Resident returns from Asian trip

STOUFFVILLE — D. I. Jeffrey, for many a years a missionary in Southeast Asia, returned recently from a three-month visit to that war-torn area of the world.

Mr. Jeffrey is a resident at Parkview Home. His tour included visits to South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos. He had not been there for eight years.

According to Vietnamese reckoning, Mr. Jeffrey is already 80 years old, a fact which managed to give him additional prestige. He had a very full itinerary for his visit.

Besides acquainting himself with many old friends, the missionary spoke to many groups that included thousands of people and visited leprosariums, refugee centres and hospitals, travelling by aircraft and car.

Mr. Jeffrey addressed his listeners in Vietnamese and sometime through an interpreter. His visit has a two-fold purpose — to re-new old acquaintances and to see for himself how the church is faring in that area of the world still in the grips of war.

Of the church, Rev. Jeffrey said: "It is a small plant that has grown into a great spreading tree." He said that young people are very active in a great many areas.

One of the more hopeful signs, he said, was when he saw that the World Vision Hospital in Phnom Penh was located on the main highway to the airport, directly across from a large university built by the Soviets.

Mr. Jeffrey said that he is happy to be back, but hasn't had much rest since his return Nov. 1. Since that time he has been busy answering his mail, which has accumulated over the three-month absence.

TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

Tuesday, November 19th, 1974 at 8:00 p.m. Municipal Building, 19 Civic Ave., Stouffville

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Board of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to discuss the following proposed Official Plan amendment whereby it is the intent of Council to:

"Consider proposed amendment no. 8 to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch, now in the Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area, which changes the land use designation from "Rural" to "Estate/Residential" on the east part of Lot 30, Concession 8. The subject site consisting of approximately 70 acres is located on the south side of the Vivian Sideroad approximately 314 feet west of the Ninth Concession Road. The purpose of the amendment is to permit a 27 lot "estate type" development."

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending document may be examined at the Clerk's Office, Municipal Building, Stouffville, during regular business hours.
