Farm Report

Some items of interest

There are several items of interest this week as we sort of wind up the growing season for this year.

Beef cow herd owners have a new loan program to tide them over this period of very bad prices for feeder calves. It's a bank loan at regular interest, for up to three years, guaranteed by the Ontario government. The limit is \$75 per calf, to a maximum of \$7500 and the loan can be used to pay off any operating expenses.

Farmers can now hold back their calves until the market is better, using loan money to pay the bills.

A big step ahead has been taken for swine breeders, with the opening of the artificial insemination centre for pigs. Frozen semen can now be obtained and used by our breeders here in York. This brings in a whole new group of bloodlines, and makes cross-breeding for all herds, big or small.

The boars are all R.O.P. tested, guaranteed free of disease, and are almost sure to improve both growth rate and carcass quality.

York, Landrace, Hampshire and Durocs are all available.

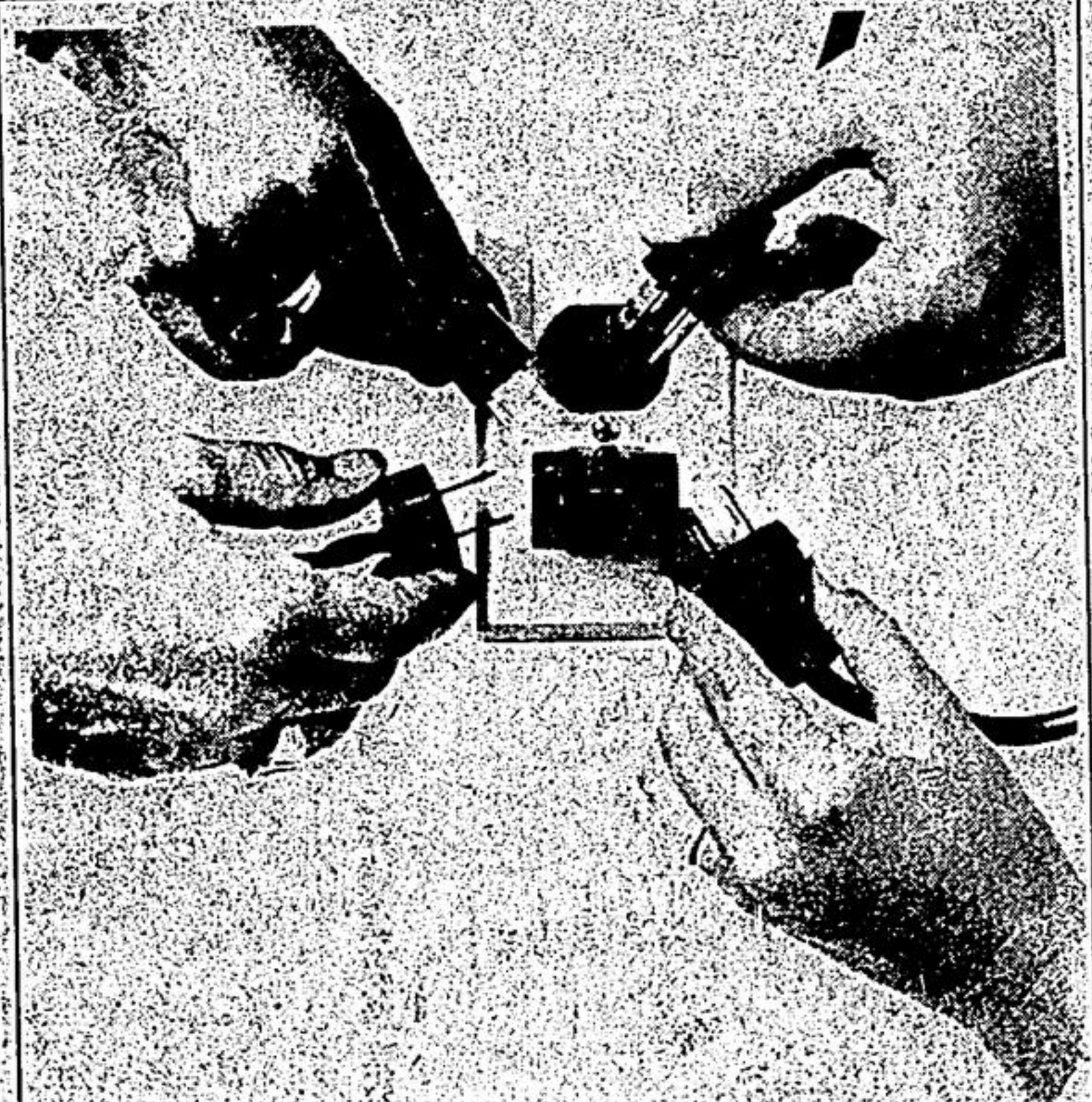
There was a big sale of tested swine breeding stock. It was for all breeds with boars, bred and open gilts, at Stratford on Saturday, Nov. 9.

This is the time to kill warble flies in cattle, despite the fact that you couldn't find one right now in the whole region of York. They are now in the grub stage under the hide in the legs and lower parts of the body. They are just starting now to do the real damage so it's time to hit them. The treatment is simple — just pour the right

amount of Neguvon or Rulene along their backs, and the grubs are killed systemically. The old method of spraying in the spring doesn't make sense at all anymore, and all of our townships are getting out of the spray business.

A day spent now getting some soil and feed samples off for testing could pay off well. A soil test helps to get fertilizer money spent where it will return a profit, and with grain prices now, feeding programs have to be right on to stay in the black with livestock.

We have containers both for soil and feed, at our office, as well as soil samplers and a hay core sampler to lend.

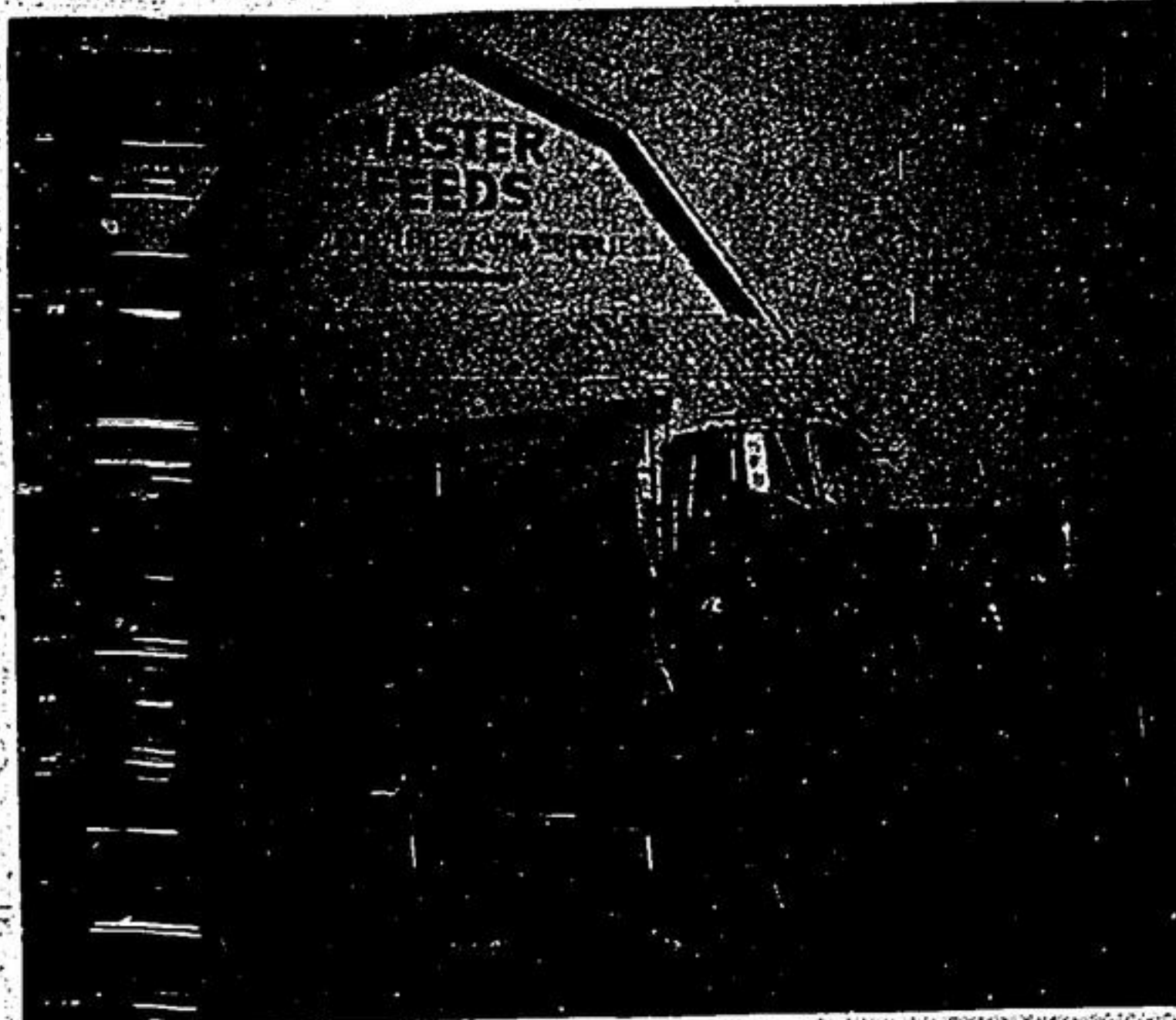
