Regional Police Commissioners were told last Tuesday that the completion date set for December of next year, may be pushed ahead and hopes now are planned on a September opening.

Commissioners were also heartened to hear that the costs for the \$1,889,000 building planned for the Richmond Hill area may come down, due to the tax reductions.

The exact amount of the saving has not yet been estimated but Commissioners were told that the architect will be submitting figures.

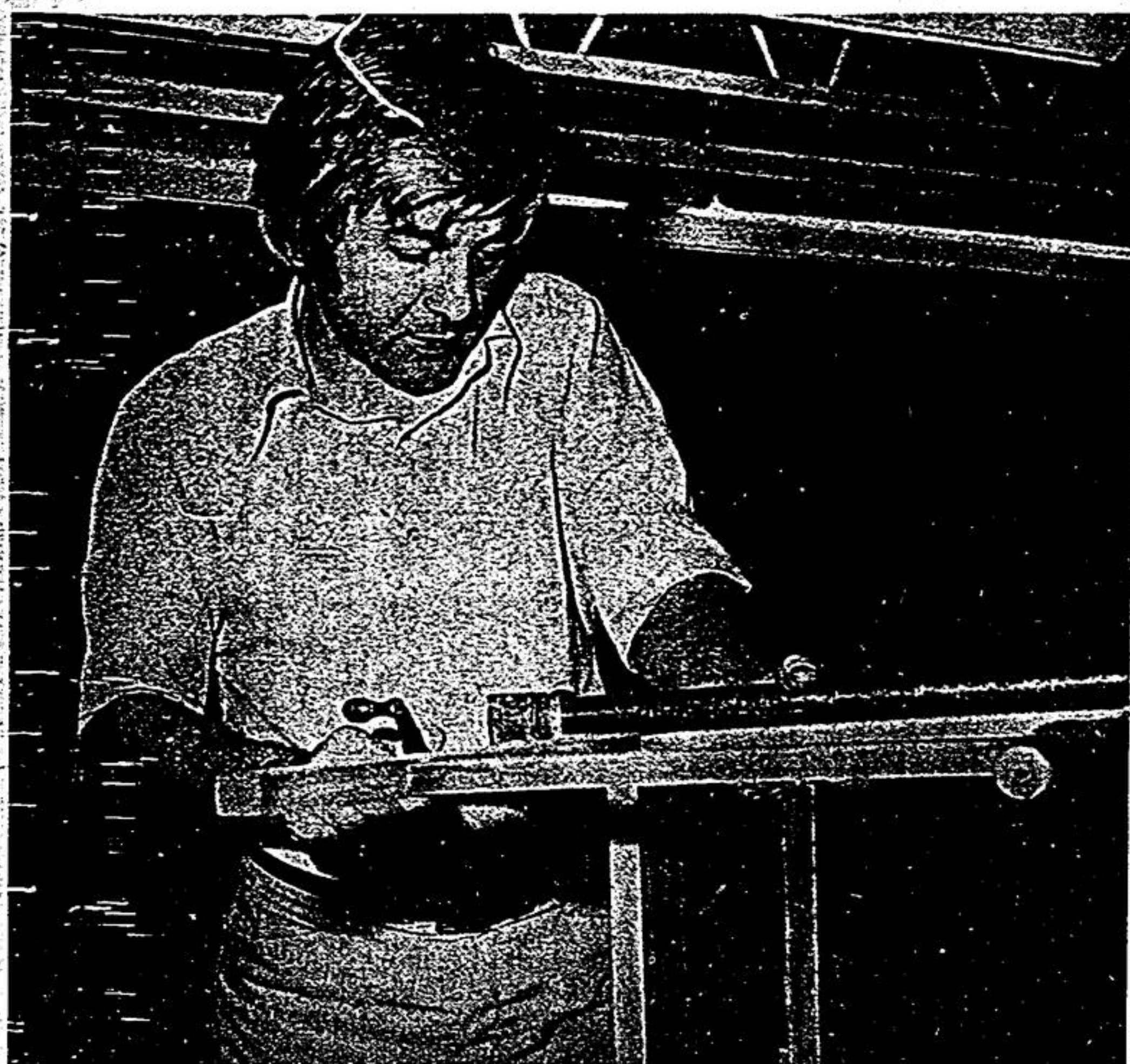

**Refinishing class Expert teaches the fine points**

STOUFFVILLE — Around the room, people are tapping chairs with mallets, sanding spinning wood on lathes, and rubbing or shellacking elderly pieces of lumber.

What is it? A Goodwill workshop? A dramatic enactment of Santa's elves at work?

Wrong. The explanation is simple. These people are learning how to refinish their furniture. They come together one evening a week at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School in a class taught by a professional cabinet-maker.

Swabbing glue on part of a 45-year-old dining room chair, Judy Brillinger of Rupert Ave. remarked: "I would much rather do something like this than go out and buy new furniture."

Besides the dining room set she is refinishing for the class, Mrs. Brillinger says she has "other projects after I finish this that would keep me going for two years."

Class members are required to bring along a project to work on through the course. Items include chairs, little tables, cabinets, rocking chairs, and four-poster beds.

Teacher of the class Winrich Weller says: "You can't expect they'll be a perfect refinisher in 20 evenings, but all in all they do have a fair amount of knowledge."

Some of the 38 people who took the class last year, he said, have moved into an evening school woodworking class this year.

Class member Heather Agnew of Tyndale Road is happy to be able to use the machines and tools at the school and "would probably take the class another year just for the use of the equipment."
