TO THE CITIZENS OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE

What do the numbers 5, 7 and 8 mean to you? They are proposed Amendments to the Official Plan of the Township of Whitchurch-Planning Area.

What does the term ESTATE RESIDENTIAL mean to you? It means that tracts of land that have been classified as rural to date, may be broken down into smaller lots.

The following are two examples of what the change in land use designation from rural to estate residential hopes to achieve.

Amendment 7 — proposes that on the east half of Lot 14, Con. 5, that 100 acres be broken down into 39 smaller lots.

Amendment 8 — proposes that an area of 70.401 acres on Vivian Rd. west of the ninth Con. be broken down into 27 smaller lots.

The Amendments, presently before Council, are the groundwork, and criteria necessary to open up the township to an influx of new residents in concentration. Once these Amendments have been passed and sanctioned at all levels of government in the province the precedent for Estate Residential development will have been set.

While the areas and issues involved seem local, the implication for the future is far reaching. Given its chance, Estate Residential will reach your area eventually. A rural life style is too precious to be supported by silence and apathy. If you have any thoughts or feelings on the issue of Estate Residential, and the Amendments trying to implement it, speak to, or write your councillors or your ratepayers association.

As residents of this township, will your best interests be served by this kind of legislation. To do nothing will only facilitate those who want it. Find out when the newly elected council meets, and attend. Be heard. Time is not the ally of those who may be opposed.

Estate Residential subdivisions, as they come into being, will remove from your rural communities, a life style that many of you choose, but will never have again!

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF UXBRIDGE

TAKE NOTICE THAT The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge, enacted By-law No. 74-65 on the 17th day of October, 1974, pursuant to the provisions to The Municipal Act, R. S. O. 1970, c.284, as amended, requiring owners of privately-owned outdoor swimming pools to erect and maintain fences and gates around such swimming pools and prescribing the height and description, and the manner of erecting and maintaining such fences and gates and which by-law prohibits persons from placing water in such pools or allowing water to remain therein until the prescribed fences and gates have been erected;

AND TAKE NOTICE THAT pursuant to the provisions of By-law No. 74-65, no privately-owned outdoor swimming pool may be excavated for, or erected and no fence or gate can be installed or erected in respect of such pool without first producing plans, therefore, and obtaining a permit certifying approval of such plans from the By-law Enforcement Officer;

AND TAKE FURTHER NOTICE that By-law No. 74-65 authorizes the By-law Enforcement Officer to refuse the issuance of such a permit for any such fence or gate that if erected would be contrary to the provisions of any by-law of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge;

The By-law Enforcement Officer is Mr. James McGuire whose offices are located in the Municipal Offices, Uxbridge, Ontario. Copies are available at the Municipal Offices.
