Dear Sir:

I am a teacher at Whitchurch Highlands and recently our school, for the first time, took great pride in entering a float in the Stouffville Santa Claus Parade. The students themselves designed and built the float with a great deal of enthusiasm and hard work. ("The Christmas Bug - One bite and you'll love the season" theme)

In addition to the float several students marched as clowns and cheerleaders. A few even brought horses from some distance to accompany the float on its travels down Main Street.

The Christmas spirit reached its climax when the parade commenced, but unfortunately that spirit was quickly dampened. The first piece of negative rapport began as we reached the centre of town. The announcer candidly introduced our float to the crowd of happy faces with a message that I strongly feel was uncalled for and discriminatory. "This is the float from Whitchurch Highlands, certainly not one of Stouffville's finest."

The students heard it too and although its intent is open to interpretation, the children felt the pain of ridicule and condemnation at that particular time.

Their disillusionment, disenchantment, and disappointment were re-echoed again, when the Tribune issued its post Santa Claus Parade newspaper.

Many wonderful pictures and words

recorded the gaiety of the occasion. Although not all of the organizations that took part were mentioned, every school that took part was all that is except for Whitchurch Highlands Public School.

The children from our school did not merit a single word - a fact that I find incredible.

I realize that our school because of its geographic location (Bloomington and the Fifth) has difficulty establishing an identity with any particular town, but the fact remains that we have many children and their parents who regard Stouffville as their home.

As a teacher who has taught in Stouffville, and now at Highlands, I feel that it is a pity that a child might consider their school, the centre of their life during their developing years, unworthy of a kind remark, or at a deeper level, social integration itself.
