The game will take place in the intermission of the skating party. The East York Concert Band will supply the music and skaters are encouraged to come in costume.

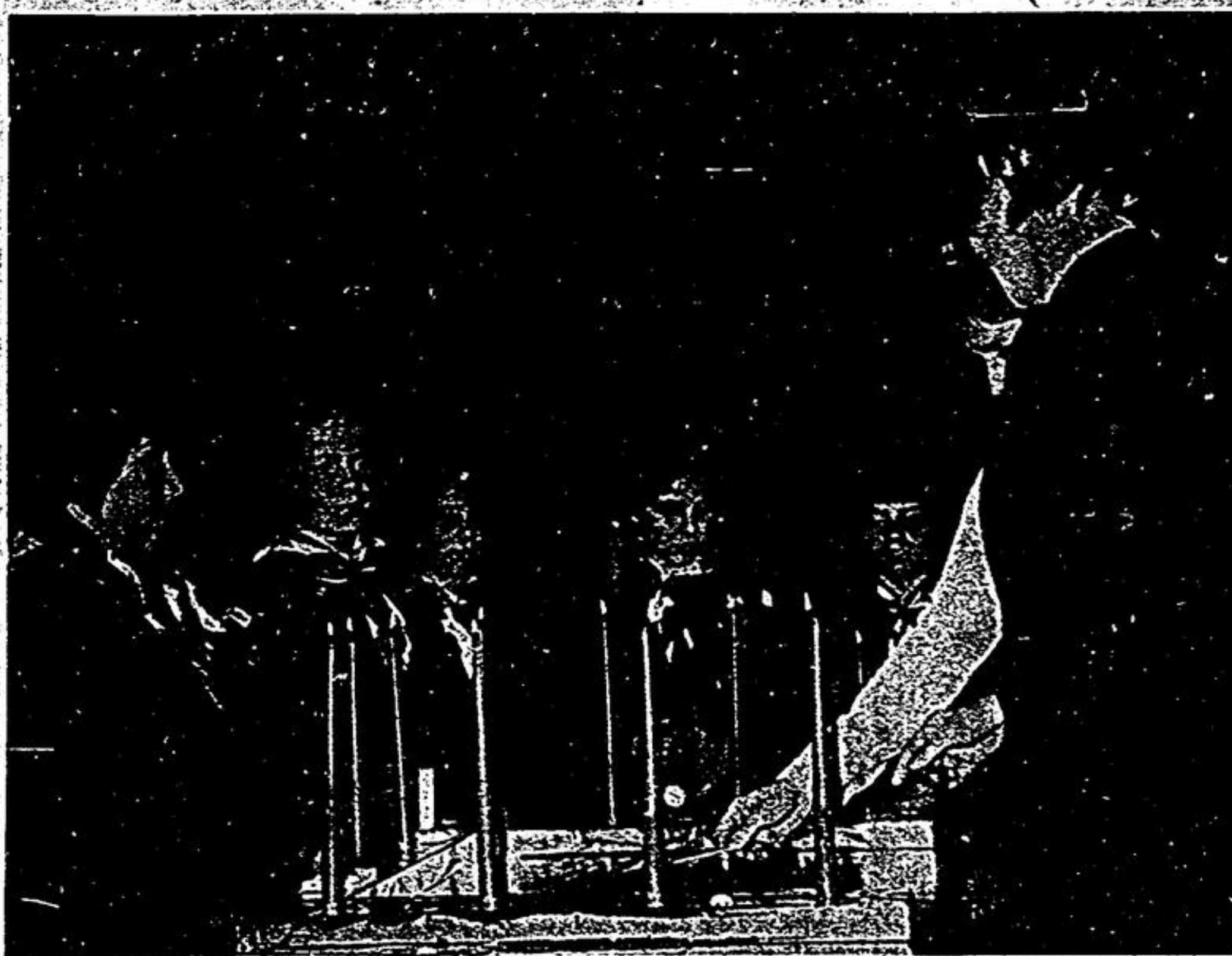

Ernest Hartley Smith Groundsman for Scarboro firm

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville area was saddened last week at the death of Ernest Hartley Smith, of 10th Line, south. Mr. Smith was in his 62nd year.

He was born near Goodwood at Gravel Hill on June 18, 1913 and at an early age moved to Stouffville. He married Lillian May McMullen on Dec. 19, 1938.

Mr. Smith worked for a number of firms in the Stouffville area and was employed with Gar Lehman and later worked on construction when the village's sewers were installed.

He had worked as a groundsman at SKF Ltd. in Scarboro for 13 years up until 18 months ago when Mr. Smith retired.

The service was held Jan. 16 at O'Neill's Funeral Home with burial at Stouffville Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife and two children — Rhoda Zydman and son George and three grandchildren — Elizabeth, Christopher and Christie Zydman.
