### Recycling Depot

## Problems crop up

STOUFFVILLE — Over 150 families have made use of the recycling depot, located on Mill St. south of Main, to date. Depot organizer John Garbutt terms it "an unqualified success."

In addition, he said, "The enthusiastic and appreciative comments from the depot's users has been encouraging to the volunteers."

The first few weeks of operation, however, have also uncovered several problems. The depot organizers have issued some "Do's" and "Don't's" which they hope will alleviate the problems.

The "Don't" list includes the following:

"DON'T bring your mixed up garbage. We have neither the time nor space to sort, store and dispose of non-recyclable material."

"DON'T bring plastic bags of any kind. Plastic jugs, styrofoam and plastic bags are no-no's. Plastic bags are acceptable as we can use them for containers."

"DON'T bring light bulbs, window glass or broken tumblers."

Under the "Do's" heading are:

"DO sort your recyclable material. Separate glass jars and bottles as to color. Keep corrugated cardboard separate from newspaper."

"DO bundle newspapers in bundles of 34 to 40 pounds. The bundling is a change from our original request, but space limitations and market requirements have necessitated this change. A bundle 14 to 18 inches high with papers folded will give approximately 30 to 40 pounds. Better yet, weigh your bundles on the bathroom scale."

"DO wash all bottles, jars and cans before bringing them in. Fermenting foods and beverages are not pleasant to the nose in an enclosed area."

"DO encourage your friends to use the depot and DO consider the possibility of offering to volunteer a few hours a month as a worker at the depot."

### Regional council tries a second time

## Don Mills change approved

YORK REGION — Regional council, for the second time, voted to take the necessary steps to change the name of Don Mills Rd. throughout York Region to Woodbine Ave.

The resolution, which passed unanimously in a recorded vote, was voted on and passed in December. According to Regional Clerk Bob Vernon the initial resolution was invalid as changing the name of a highway requires the approval of three-quarters of council, and three-quarters of the members were not present at that time.

The name is being changed as the present road names are quite confusing as the portion south of Steeles Ave. is named Woodbine and Metro Toronto's Don Mills Rd. is located half a mile to the west.

The road will be renamed through the entire length of York Region from Steeles Ave. to Lake Simcoe. It is presently known by three different names: County Rd. No. 8 Don Mills Rd., Country Rd. No. 12 and County Rd. No. 8A.

The by-law will be drawn-up by regional staff and forwarded to a County Court Judge for approval.

The engineering Committee has recommended the new name not come into effect until July 1, 1975.

The Town of Markham has also been given the approval to commence a similar process to change New Leslie St. to Don Mills Rd. from Steeles Ave. to 14th Ave.
