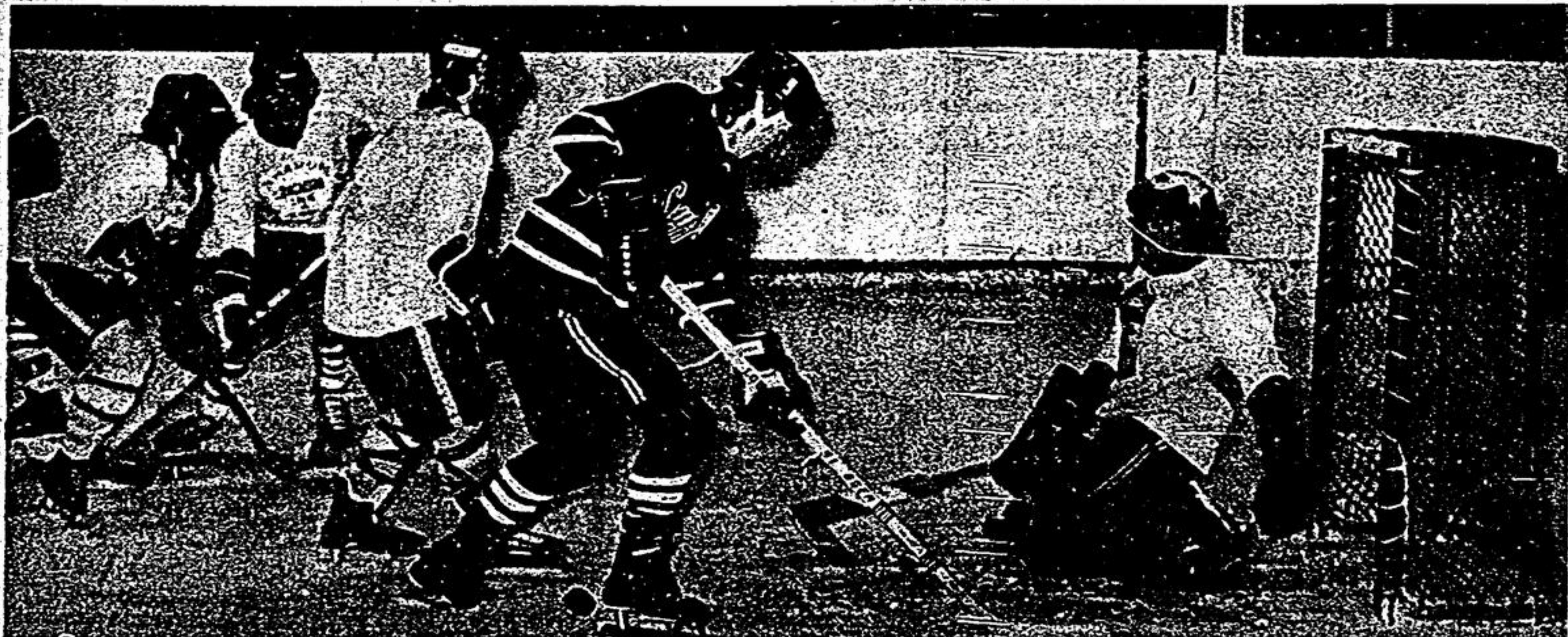


IGA peewees finish first in league
