

I'll never forget my first hockey tryout. On the way to the arena, I was so nervous. But when I stepped on the ice, my fears soon disappeared washed away in a flood of tears.

They all laughed; the manager laughed, the coach laughed, the kids laughed. It was like somebody had sprayed laughing gas into the Mormon Tabernacle Choir rehearsal hall. And just 'cause I was fat. Oh... didn't I tell you that. Yes, I was fat. Not just chubby, or hefty, or big-boned. I was F-A-T — fat. The only one who didn't laugh was the assistant coach — my big sister's boyfriend. He told me to calm down.

"Tell them what position you want, skate down to the far net and back," he said: "Give it all you've got."

All the first kids wanted to play forward — just like me. Half way through, they wanted to be defencemen, figuring they'd have a better chance to make the team. Not me — it was forward or nothing.

Back in the locker room, I started tearing apart my dreams for NHL stardom, the same way you tear apart a soapbox racer when your mother tells you she wants the wheels of your baby brother's carriage back.

"That's OK. I didn't want to be on your dumb team anyway," I said.
