**Sewage study approved**

STOUFFVILLE - Council has approved a \$6,000 engineering study on the sewage treatment plant.

Mayor Gordon Ratcliff termed it a "very preliminary study" which will determine what size the former village can eventually be expanded to.

The study will be the forerunner of the actual design of the proposed sewage plant extension. Depending on the degree to which the plant can be extended the population could go as high as 9,500 to 10,000 people.

The present population is under 6,000 and is expected to reach 6,000 with the completion of the Thicketwood subdivision. The first phase of which is now under construction.
