Pickering High Semester system to be introduced in Fall of '75

PICKERING — In September 1975, Pickering High School will be going on the full credit semester system schedule. It is a system in which students take four or five courses for half the year, then at mid-term they start three or four new courses to complete the school year. The period lengths will be increased to 70 minutes to allow for greater "flexibility in teaching and learning experiences," according to an announcement sent out by the school. It will mean fewer courses for which students must prepare at any one time and thus allows concentration in time on fewer subjects which should facilitate greater in-depth learning, the announcement read. "The longer period will allow for improved techniques in study, research and preparation. If a student does fail a course in the first semester, he can possibly make it in the second semester which follows. This means that students need not waste a whole year on a failed course." The new schedule will increase extra-curricular activities at the school since many will be scheduled during the lunch period.

Muriel Gostick Long-time Pickering teacher

GREEN RIVER — Born in Pickering Township, Miss Gostick attended Ontario Bible College and Toronto Teacher's College before embarking on a career involved in child evangelism in Western Canada. After that she entered the teaching profession. She taught in Penetanguishene, and Mount Pleasant School on the 7th Conc. of Pickering. For the past nine years she has taught at Green River Public School. She was an active member of Green River Baptist Church where she served as assistant organist, Sunday school pianist and Sunday school teacher. Always a great lover of books and history, Miss Gostick did considerable research into the history of the Baptist churches in the area. The results of her work are installed in the archives of McMaster University in Hamilton. Assisted by Mr. G. Findlay, the funeral was conducted by Rev. C. Emery from Dixon Funeral Home in Markham with interment at St. John's Cemetery on the 7th Conc. of Pickering. Miss Gostick was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gostick. She was predeceased by an older brother, Maurice John. She is also survived by a brother Russell of Clarendon and five sisters — Myrtle (Mrs. Walter Foote) of Woodville, Kathleen of Clarendon, Nellie (Mrs. William Hopkins) of Ashburn, Ada (Mrs. Fred Hodgson) of Brougham, and Edith of Toronto. She has two nephews, Gary Gostick and Maurice Hopkins.
