

Industrial proposal for Gormley area

GORMLEY — A 28 lot industrial development has been proposed for the north-east corner of Don Mills and the Stouffville Rd. The 45 acre parcel is set back 600 feet from the highway frontage which is zoned highway commercial according to Richard Sheridan of Whitechurch Stouffville Realty Ltd. Mr. Sheridan presented the scheme to Planning Board who deferred the matter to the next planning committee for discussion. The parcel would be broken up into lots of one acre or slightly more and could be assembled in groups to meet the needs of any particular industry, according to Mr. Sheridan. He pointed out the site is next to proposed Hwy. 404 and is under a Minister's Order restraining residential use. He insisted that although the land is made

up of high quality Milliken loam, the location tends to eliminate agricultural use. The land is not serviced and would depend on individual wells and septic tanks. Councillor Merlyn Baker commented the lands to the east and north are still agricultural. Councillor Art Starr suggested the applicant not be given "too much encouragement".

Mr. and Mrs. Harry A. Newman Founding Lion and wife celebrate 60th

GREENWOOD — Harry A. Newman, believed to be the oldest practising lawyer in Ontario at 87, and his wife Margaret, celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary Sunday, February 16, 1975. Mr. and Mrs. Newman reside at Greenwood, Ontario. Mrs. Newman is the former Margaret Ridley Follinsbee of Strathroy, Ontario, and has been

very active in community work in the Durham area with her husband and family. Harry Newman was instrumental in forming the first Lions Club of Toronto in February, 1920, and in 1922 was elected President of his club. In June 1920, he attended the International Convention of Lions at Denver, Colorado and was elected a Vice-President. In July 1921, at the Lions Convention held in Omaha, Nebraska he was elected President of Lions International. Mr. Newman thus became the first Canadian to be elected to the office of International President of the Club. In March of 1967, the Lions International honoured Mr. Newman for his many years of work with the club at a Testimonial Dinner in Toronto. Mr. Newman still maintains near perfect attendance in his home



club of Toronto-Central and regularly attends International Board Meetings and International Conventions. Born in Dunnville, Ontario, June 9th 1887, Mr. Newman attended school locally, later at Osgoode Hall Law School, and was admitted to the Bar of Ontario in August, 1911. He has practised law continually since that time. Mr. and Mrs. Newman have four sons: The Reverend Harry Follinsbee Newman, B.A., L.Th.; The Reverend Canon Robert Stevenson Newman, B.A., B.D., S.T.M.; Thomas Allen Newman, Q.C., who practises law in partnership with his father; William G. Newman, B.S.A., Minister of the Environment for Ontario. A daughter, Anne, resides in Cork, Ireland. The couple celebrated their diamond anniversary at their Greenwood home.

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Stouffville is too great a price to pay for the airport. York Simcoe, MP, Sinclair Stevens, railed against the Liberal government in Ottawa, "the Federal government are the most artful dodgers we've ever had at the Federal level." He said that Ontario Premier William Davis had assured him that he (Mr. Davis) would not favor the Pickering airport. Mr. Stevens added that the airport is not necessary and that the \$1.5 billion expected to be spent on it would be better used to provide municipal services badly needed in the area. "The money could be better spent serving 100 per cent of the people not just the 15 per cent who choose to travel periodically," he said. York South MPP Donald Deacon claimed that if Premier Davis said, "no tomorrow, the Pickering airport would not be built." Other speakers who reiterated their opposition to the airport included Toronto Alderman William Kilborne, NDP representative, Ellen Adams, Scarborough Mayor Paul Cosgrove. Dr. Godfrey, who moderated the meeting, urged people in the audience to contact friends in Toronto and get them to write letters opposing the airport. After a relatively brief question and answer period, the meeting adjourned, with the stinging indictment by Mr. Tyrer ringing through the auditorium.
