We invite both Mr. Harcourt, and that reader to contact the secretary of the Save Stouffville Committee to attend the next general meeting to discuss their views. If they choose to come we would hope to show them that our campaign against the Pickering Airport does not consist of "alarmists having a field day" but of concerned citizens who hope to preserve a way of life.

It is dangerous, these days, to remain passively quiet when reasonable arguments should be brought to the attention of our leaders.

The thrust of Save Stouffville's Committee's campaign, which will continue, is that our community is threatened by the unnecessary growth of Metropolitan

Toronto. That growth requires things like dump sites and airports.

To channel growth in this province in more rational directions, will save communities like Stouffville. We are not a minority because many of our country's leaders and planners agree. The controversy in cabinet over the airport attests to that.

We also know that with the support of municipal governments in places like northern Ontario, the provincial government can easily control Toronto's sprawl.

We feel that reason will prevail against irrationality.

We hope to see Mr. Harcourt and "name withheld by request" at one of our meetings.

YORK REGION — Council of the Town of Richmond Hill has endorsed the Family Life Services.

In a resolution forwarded to York Regional Council they urged that body to request the Health and Social Services Committee in conjunction with representatives of the Newmarket and District Ministerial Association meet with the Honorable Rene Brunelle Minister of Community and Social Services.

The purpose of the meeting requested by

Richmond Hill Council would be to "secure provincial financial support on an on-going basis" for the Family Life Centres which at the moment are facing a funding crisis.

The resolution, which was deferred until the

next Health and Social Services Committee meeting, further requested that Mayor Gladys Rolling of East Gwillimbury take the problem of funding to the Municipal Liaison Committee.

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
