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Uxbridge Fair

Camper difficulties ended

UXBRIDGE — The Uxbridge Fair, tentatively scheduled for Sept. 5, 6, 7 this year, is hoping to put an end to past difficulties with campers on the Fairgrounds.

This was a concern stated by Fair Board president Dr. Rod Freeman, who headed a delegation to Township Council. There have been problems, he said, with campers in Elgin Park refusing to leave during the Fair; he also mentioned vandalism.

UXBRIDGE — Uxpool wants \$106,032 to operate in 1975, according to a budget submitted to Uxbridge Council Feb. 27.

The budget represents a \$26,000 increase over 1974, with income from pool rentals bringing in an estimated \$39,070. The remainder of the money would come from the township.

The wage item in the budget drew fire from Mayor Carl Puterbaugh. It totals \$68,232 to pay salaries of 21 full and part-time instructors for the various courses offered at the pool.

The mayor asked the board members to explore ways of reducing the expenditure. Board members explained that \$20,000 of the amount is recoverable from the Durham Board of Education, leaving salaries for 1975 at \$48,000.

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A block building, said Dr. Freeman, would cost about \$6,000 to build. A similar structure of frame construction, would cost \$1,000 less, but would be susceptible to vandalism. The Fair Board so far has grants totalling \$5,000, and Dr. Freeman suggested the Township might be able to make up the balance so a sturdier building could be constructed.

While no definite action was taken, council seemed disposed to consider the request. A bylaw was passed to authorize signing of the agreement, and this will be finalized after some minor changes.

After some discussion, township solicitor Alec McLennan suggested that the municipality rent all the camping spaces to the Fair Board for the days of the annual event, at a nominal charge of one dollar. This met general approval, and will be incorporated into the agreement between the Township and the Fair Board.

The second matter concerned a new building the Fair Board wants to erect on the grounds. This is to be used for local women to display arts and crafts during the Fair.

Of the intermediate (grade seven) students a project in the earth sciences category on snakes by Michael Mumford and Danny LeBlanc was chosen.
