STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville Lions Club, in association with the Ontario Society for Crippled Children, has a special interest in raising funds through Easter Seal Fund.

The Stouffville club gives funds on a regular basis to support Wayne Carr, six of Unionville who was born without legs. The lad needs a new set of artificial limbs each year and the local Lions buy them. The cost is about \$2,000 per year. The equipment is supplied by the Ontario Society for Crippled Children with expenses paid by the Stouffville Lions.

To all appearances, Wayne is a normal Grade 1 student at Unionville Public School. He is the adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Carr.

About Wayne's life at school Mrs. Carr said: "He gets along well socially and academically and has many friends. They're used to his handicap."

"He's a rough and tough boy," Mr. Carr added. "He keeps wanting to climb trees."

Among other activities, Wayne attends a handicapped swim program on Saturdays and has learned how to skate at the local arena. At times such as in

the summertime at the beach, Mrs. Carr said, Wayne wishes he had feet like other children, but for the most part, he pretty well accepts the fact.

The Lions Club is distributing envelopes with Easter Seals to residents in the Stouffville area, and are seeking donations they are able to continue to support Wayne Carr.

Stouffville boy hurt in car-truck crash

STOUFFVILLE — A Stouffville boy is in satisfactory condition in Orthopedic and Arthritic Hospital in Toronto, after he was trapped for more than an hour in the wreckage of a car and snowplow which collided near Proton Station, Feb. 28.

Kevin O'Connor, 15, son of Dr. and Mrs. Terry O'Connor, R. R. 4, Stouffville, and his aunt Helen O'Connor of Pickering, were both

injured in the crash. Miss O'Connor was transferred from hospital in Markdale to St. Michael's Hospital.

The car they were in skidded out of control into the path of a snowplow on Highway 10. Dundalk firefighters cut through the wreckage to free the boy. They were on their way to a skiing expedition at Kimberley.

The roads were very icy at the time of the mishap.
