Addition approved
 UXBRIDGE — Work is to begin next spring on an \$820,000 addition to Uxbridge Secondary School. Durham Board of Education decided March 10. It will include a library, gymnasium and six classrooms. Enrollment at USS is just over 900 for the 1974-75 school year. Presently, portables are being used to accommodate students until the addition is complete.
 Construction is expected to begin in April 1976 with completion set for late in that year. The last addition to the school, which was built in 1922, was made in 1962. The new classrooms will be built above the school's trade shops, while gymnasium library will be on the south side of the present building.
