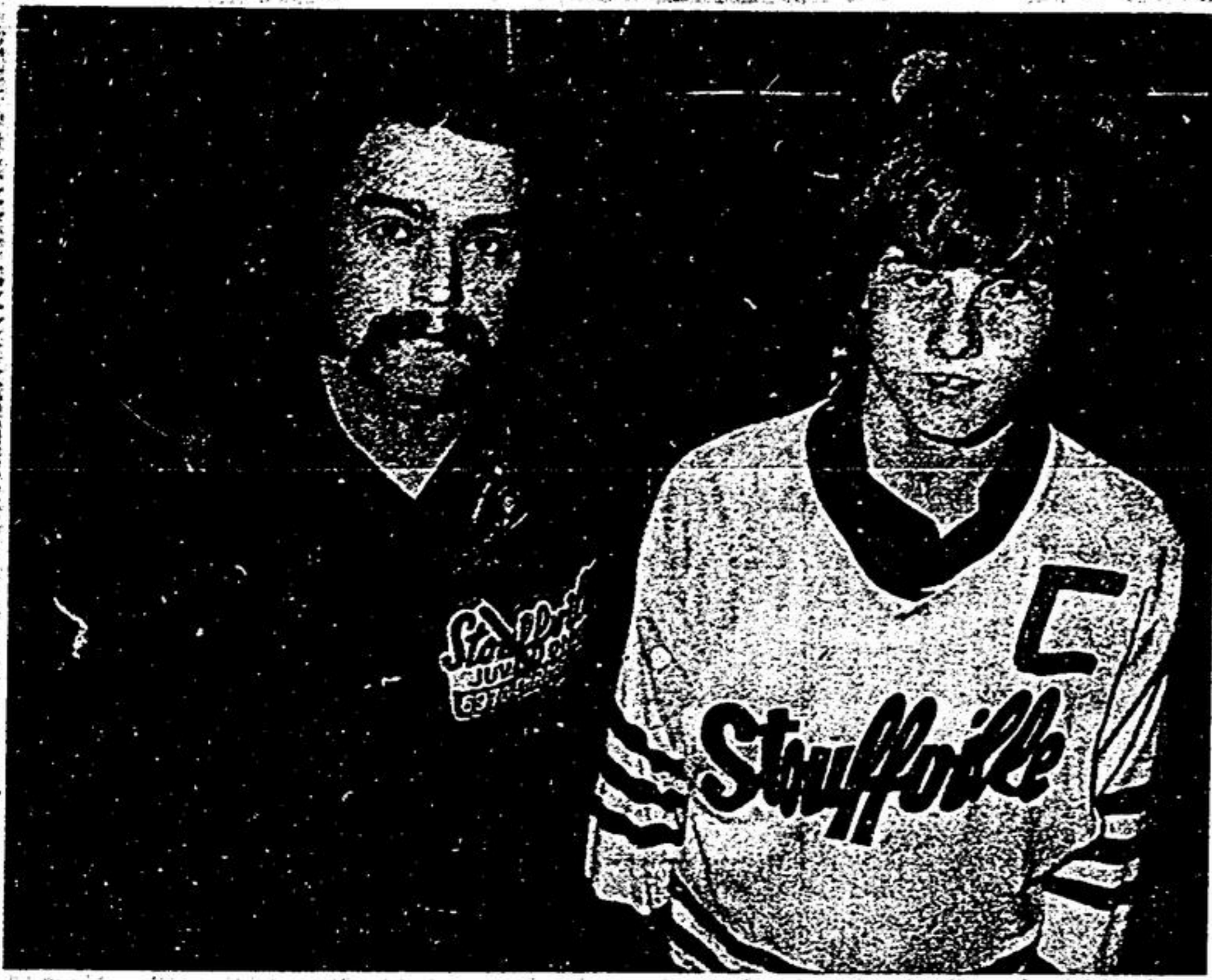


Last night in Walkerton

Concluding peewee game

STOUFFVILLE — The Ontario peewee "A" championship was determined last night in Walkerton, with each team tied going into the game with two wins each.

The Stouffville IGA peewees began the series with 5-2 and 3-0 victories, but were squeezed to the lower end of 3-2 and 4-3 scores in the second two contests.

At the fourth game Tuesday in Stouffville, the story was "the agony of defeat." In a tension-filled finale, Walkerton held onto their lead while Stouffville assaulted the Walkerton goal repeatedly.

The Walkerton goals came all in a row, with Steve Berberick, Paul Berberick, Dan Weber and Brian Weber ramming home counters.

Sean Wilson finally pulled Stouffville on the scoreboard with an unassisted lifting shot into the Walkerton goal.

With the scoreboard showing 4-1 the final period began. Stouffville's golden chance came with two Walkerton boys in the penalty box. Just before the two minutes ran out, Dave Raymer triggered a goal for Stouffville on a Dave McKenzie pass as Stouffville massed around the goal.

At 5:03 in the period, another chance was afforded on a Walkerton penalty. In a close-in play Tony Leger knocked in the final Stouffville goal with Gary Carr and Ted Waite assisting.

As the minutes ticked down, Stouffville made repeated attempts, but was foiled. With a minute

to go, coach Jody Holden pulled Stouffville's goalie. On a Walkerton rush that followed, Stouffville's Paul Barrie acted as the ad hoc goalie, stopping one shot from a prone position.

Despite the strong final effort, it was Walkerton who came out the winners and still in contention for the championship.

In the 3-2 loss on Sunday, both Stouffville goals were fired by Scott

Brown, with Paul Barry assisting on one.

Scoring opened on a Stouffville goal in the first period, with Walkerton tying the game in period two. In the final period, Walkerton went ahead 3-1. Stouffville managed one more marker but was unable to tie the game before the final buzzer.

The game "could have gone either way," according to IGA coach Jody Holden. "There was good goaltending on both sides."

3-1 record in championship series

Juveniles take tough games

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville juvenile's first loss of the year and two hard-fought wins, sums up action in the Ontario finals series with St. Mary's last week.

The fifth game (and final, if Stouffville won) was set for last night in St. Mary's.

The loss came in St. Mary's on April 2 when Stouffville was forced to play without seven players who didn't make it on time due to traffic tie-ups. It was the first loss in 47 games this season.

Perhaps the juveniles' best-played game of the year oc-

curred Monday night in Stouffville, when they skated to a 7-4 win in overtime.

St. Mary's took a 2-0 lead early in the game, but Stouffville tied the score before the first period ended. The only marker in the second period was an unassisted tally by Dave Mumford.

In the third, St. Mary's Rod Petrie knotted the score at 3-3, followed by a Dave Mumford goal from Andy Leitch and Craig Waite. The score gain was tied by St. Mary's on a Tom Bayley goal, moving the game into overtime.

In the 10-minute extra period, Stouffville proceeded to put the game out of reach with three goals, including a final open-net tally by Scott Connor with four minutes remaining.

Top in Stouffville scoring were Connor and Dave Mumford, both with two goals each and Andy Leitch with two assists. One goal and one assist were contributed by Craig Waite, Ted Assinck and Matt Leslie. Kevin Barrick also picked up an assist.

Rod Petrie led St. Mary's scoring with a pair, while Tom Bayley

and Mike Cubberly made one each.

Baseball schedule announced

STOUFFVILLE — The softball league in Whitechurch, Stouffville will this year expand to include ages 8 up to 19 years; and games for the "teen age" teams will be scheduled at floodlight ball parks so that those

working for the summer will still be included in the ball activity.

Registrations for the league will be held on Tuesday, April 12, and Saturday, April 15 at Latham Hall in Stouffville, Ballantrae Community Center, and Vandorf Community Center.

An umpire and coaches clinic will be held as well with the opening session to be held at Christ Anglican Church at 10 a.m. on Saturday, April 19. Qualified umpires will be paid.

President of the Whitechurch Stouffville Baseball Association, Jack Wedley has announced that coaches are needed in the Stouffville area and would appreciate hearing from anyone who may be interested. This year all

games will be scheduled from Monday to Thursday and there will be no games scheduled on holiday weekends, which should make it more convenient for persons involved in the league.

Position clarified

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville juveniles fan Lois Holder clarified her position in a letter to the Tribune this week.

"I feel that as a hockey fan you should cheer your team on and complain if players are hurt or if a player is penalized," she wrote. "Or, if a fan on either side is crude, he should be removed by the police, usually in attendance at Stouffville."

The letter was written in reply to a response by Unionville fan Freda Crane in last week's Tribune.

Mrs. Holder further stated that the spitting

incident she viewed did involve "a Stouffville player as the victim," although Mrs. Crane may have seen a similar incident, she said.

The Stouffville fans that she (Mrs. Holder) was defending in her March 27 letter were the "hockey-loving, sports-minded decent people who attend each and every game," she said, and not the "small percent of rotten beer-drinking, foul-mouthed ones found in all arenas."

Mrs. Holder added that she does not have "a son or relative playing with the Stouffville Juveniles, but if we did I would be proud to admit it."
