Juveniles win title

STOUFFVILLE — In what can only be called a fantastic year, the Stouffville juveniles captured the OMHA juvenile "B" championships and the Lionel Conacher Memorial Trophy. It was the second juvenile championship for Stouffville in six years. The first came in the 1969-70 season.

In the 51-game season, the juveniles lost only one game and were tied once by the southern Ontario triple "A" finalist team, Wexford. During the season, Stouffville scored 501 goals and allowed only 70. They captured the Lindsay juvenile tournament and in February set a number of scoring

records in capturing their division of the North American Silver Stick Championship in Mooretown. The Jack Harman Memorial Trophy came to Stouffville as winners of the Lakeshore Juvenile Championships.

The third game was back in St. Mary's and Stouffville outpassed and outskated their way to a 6-3 victory.

The fourth game played in Stouffville was probably the most interesting from the fans' view. St. Mary's took a 2-0 lead, which Stouffville battled back to tie. In regulation time, the lead seceded back and forth and remained deadlocked at 4-4 when the final buzzer sounded. In overtime, Stouffville dominated the entire 10 minutes putting away three goals to win 7-4.
