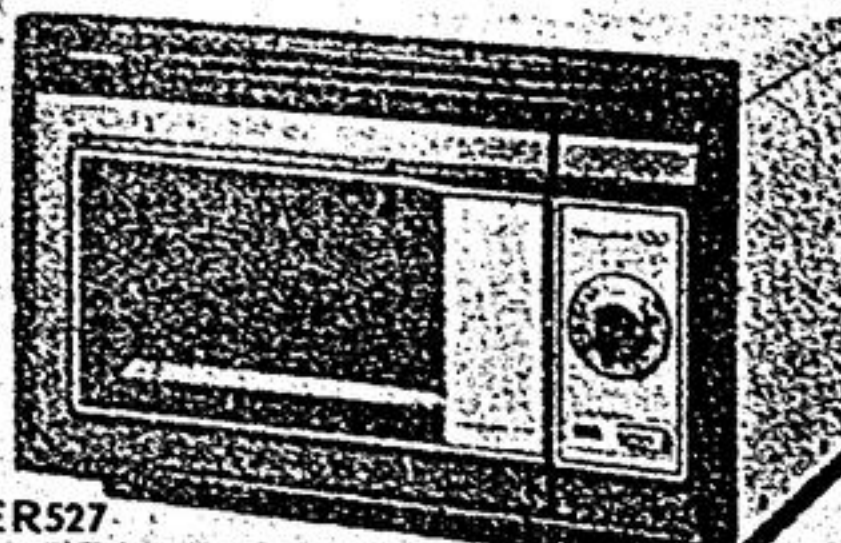
May Prom

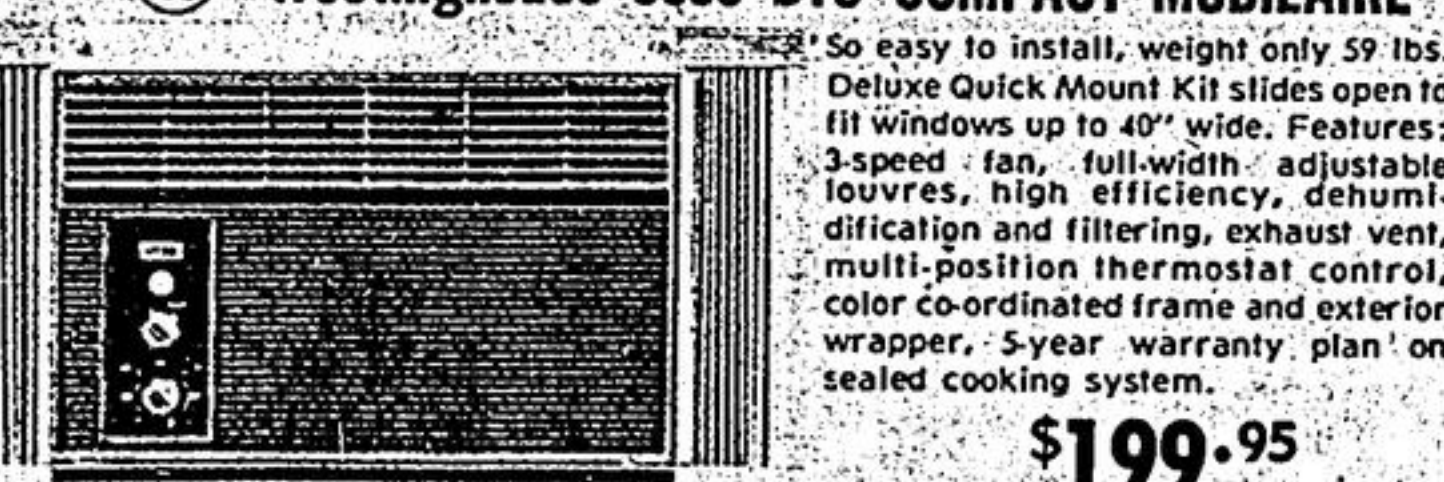
