Titanic's anniversary

 On April 15, 63 short years ago, the unsinkable Titanic went down. It was referred to as "The ship God Himself could not sink".
 In two hours and forty minutes after its collision with an iceberg it floundered and sank. Its recorded list of over 2200 contained the

name of many very wealthy and influential of the day. It carried only 20 life boats, not nearly enough, and those only partly filled. Appetite and pleasure were so important the chef received twelve times the salary of the wireless operator. The look-out man was not equipped with proper glasses so that he saw, but not clearly. The

owner kept in his pocket the warning of danger, and scoffed at the request to reduce speed.
 The Lord's day went by on the great ship with no prayer, hymn, service or thought of God. At 11:40 that night tragedy struck. Even after collision men kept from women and children word of the impending doom. Tottering on the brink of eternity they drank liquor, played cards and danced to the tune of Alexander's Rag-time band.

Anniversary services at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 4, will be highlighted respectively by Rev. Donald Powell, Moderator of East Toronto Presbytery and former Missionary to Japan and Rev. Douglas Davis, former long-time pastor of Stouffville United Church. Special music is planned and all are cordially welcome.

Only shortly before its fatal plunge to the bottom did the band start to play "Nearer my God to Thee". Then they realized all hope was gone. This floating unsinkable castle on its maiden voyage plunged to the ocean floor shooting hundreds of bodies into the air in its final spray of doom and death.
 1513 lives were sacrificed on the altar of appetite and pleasure with practically no thought for eternity.
