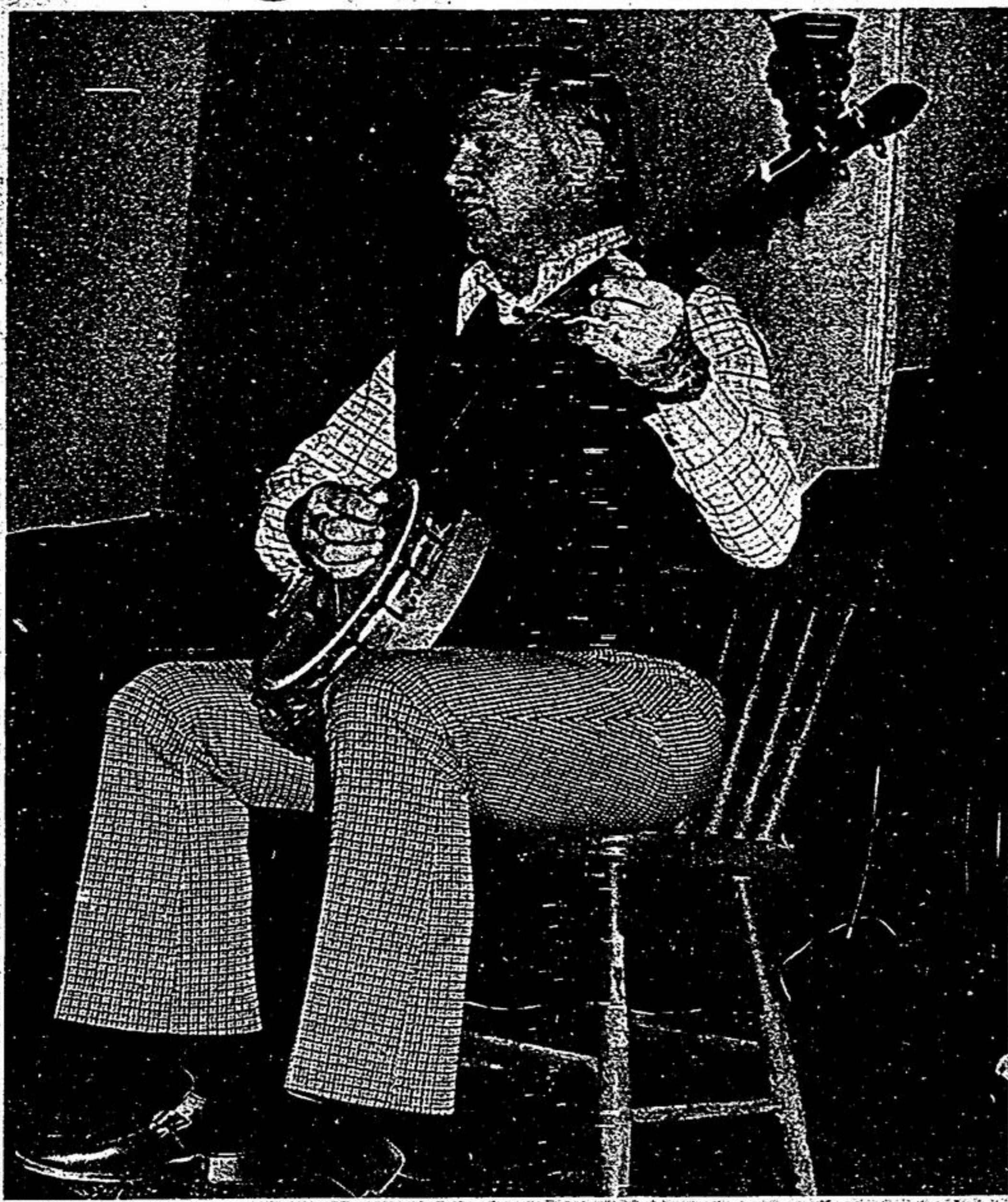


Parkview News
