Claremont man

Could box to world title

CLAREMONT — This hamlet may soon have a world boxing champion as one of its residents. Clyde Gray, who owns a home north of Claremont on Brock Road, will be taking an Angel Espada of Puerto Rico on June 28 to determine the world welterweight championship.

Actually, that would give him the title in the World Boxing Association, but not in the World Boxing Council which holds sway in Mexico and England. The WBA recently stripped Jose Napoles of Mexico of his title because he had not signed with a recognized contender within a specified time period.

Originally, a fight between Gray and Espada had been set up for April 5, with each fighter guaranteed \$30,000. That fight had been cancelled, and for the new fight, the two will receive up to \$50,000.

Also, Gray will receive 20 percent of all U.S. TV revenue after expenses. Both NBC and CBS are interested in the televised rights. In Canada, the fight will be either broadcast on closed circuit or on home television but the decision has not yet been made.

Gray, 28, has never met Espada, 25. Gray's record stands at 47-3-1, while Espada's is 35-5, but the Puerto Rican hasn't been beaten in the last five years.

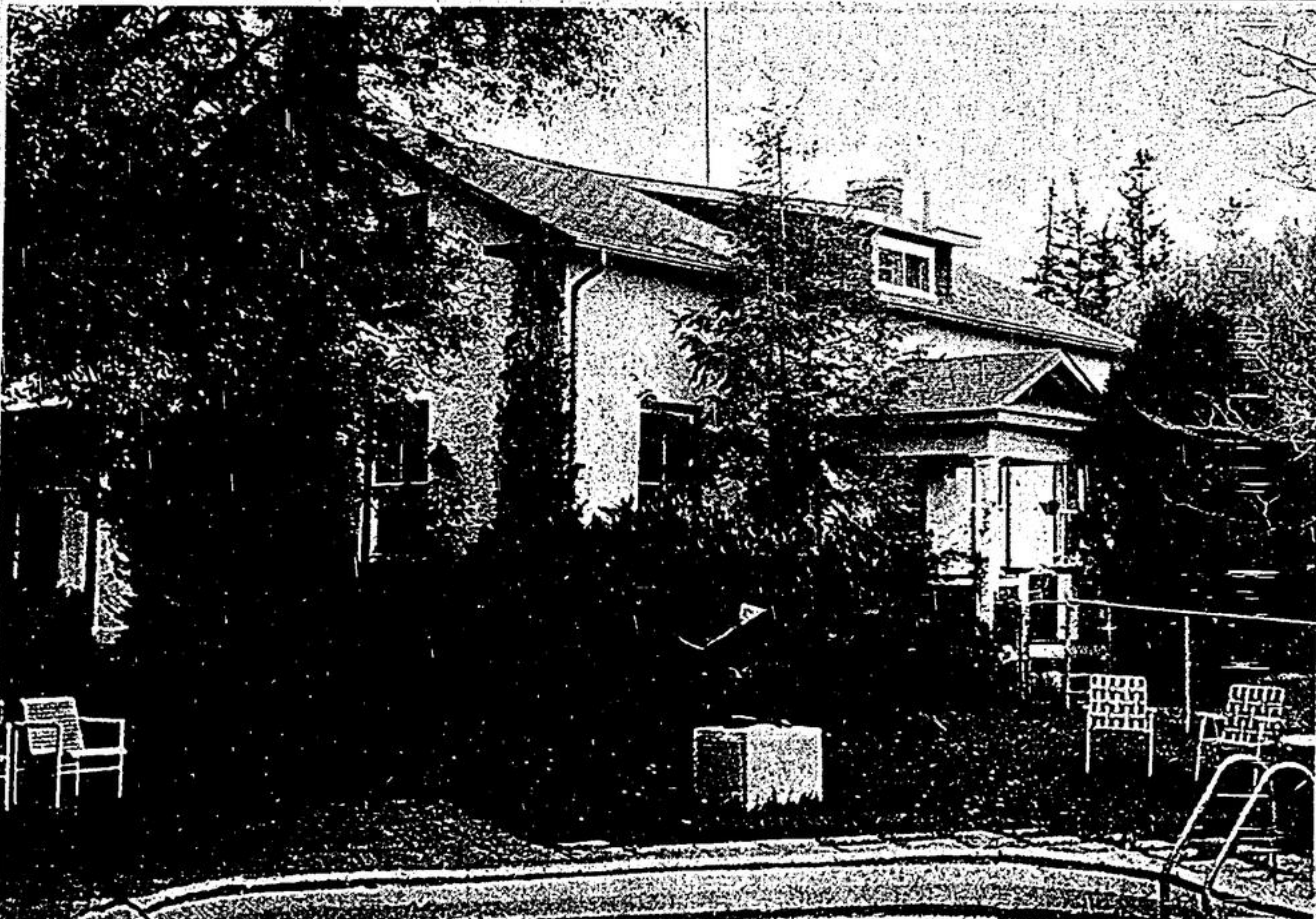

Chapman's resignation demanded

(continued from page 1) said as trustees plowed through the weighty document.

"I'm sorry I called on you," Mr. Sim retorted.

The second draft of the 1975 budget was prepared reflecting a reduction of about \$1.8 million under the first draft in the elementary section and about \$250,000 over the first draft in the secondary expenditures.

As accepted, the elementary estimate is still about \$1 million under the expenditure ceiling.

The budget meeting was preceded by a 15-minute speech by Joyce Painter, president of the York County Elementary Teachers' Association of Federations, asking that trustees approve the elementary budget to reflect the expenditure ceilings approved by the Ministry of Education.

"Our provincial federations have for several years been concerned about the disparity in the ceiling between the elementary

and secondary panels," she said.

"The disparity seems clearly to say that elementary children have fewer needs and are, indeed, less important than secondary pupils," she said.

Mrs. Painter said the board is being "penny wise and pound foolish" in economizing in education costs at the elementary level.

As the board considered spending in the grant ceilings in the elementary panel, Mrs. Painter slipped a note to Mr. Chapman reminding trustees the elementary teachers wanted spending to the expenditure ceilings.

The audience applauded and cheered as Mr. Chapman read the note to the group.

"I hope it is understood teachers are not helping their cause by the applause," Mr. Sim snapped. He said trustees understood the motion on the floor.

Trustees initially approved by a vote of 14 to five spending to the expenditure ceilings in the secondary panel but decided to do a line by line evaluation of the elementary expenditures. However, as the meeting progressed and

recommendations for increasing or decreasing functions by \$75 to \$100 amounts became numerous, trustees gave blanket approval to budgeting to the grant ceilings in the elementary panel.

The vote for accepting grant ceilings was tied eight to eight, and Mr. Sim broke the tie in favor of the motion.

Staff was directed to recommend areas where the increase could be most wisely effected. Several motions by Aurora trustee Norm Weller for cutting planning and development functions from the

budget were not heard since trustees approved the budget totals rather than challenging individual items.

Mr. Weller rejected giving total approval to the budget.

"I'll go for money in the classroom," he said. "If you tell me where they're going to spend the money, I'll vote for it."

But he said trustees shouldn't vote "blind." And trustees decided not to cut their salaries since the classroom would not suffer in the second revised budget.

Zoning changes to control clubs

STOUFFVILLE — amendment to the zoning by-law restricting these uses to land designated as open space.

The current by-law now automatically allows these land uses on any property in the municipality which is zoned rural. The town has no control whatsoever over any of these enter-

prises proposed for rurally zoned land.

The resolution calls for the commencement of "any technical or legal work" required to amend the zoning by-law.

The opinion flood plain land would be suitable for golf courses.

It is hoped the amendment will give council effective control over these uses.

The amendment will make current operations of this nature non-conforming uses and they would require a re-zoning to expand.
