Sudden death community's loss

CLAREMONT — The Village was shocked last week at the death of a well known and very popular resident, Ilean Ruth Whitney, who died in Centenary Hospital, Monday, May 26. She collapsed at her home and passed away from cardiac arrest in half an hour after arriving at the hospital.

Mrs. Whitney was an outgoing person, full of fun, and always ready to help when needed. She was in charge of one of the school buses, trans-

porting the children to school and to their swimming lessons. In fact, she took swimming lessons, herself, so that she could join her charges. Her popularity was in evidence at her funeral; there were tear stained young faces, and many older ones.

Forty members of the Claremont Legion Ladies Auxiliary, Branch No. 483, in full uniform, conducted a Memorial Service at 10:15 a.m. Thursday, May 29, in the McEachnie Funeral Home in Pickering. Mrs. Whitney was an active member of the Auxiliary. Zone Commander, Audrey Bate of Bowmanville, was in charge of the service.

Surviving is her husband, Ross; two daughters, Jackie, (Mrs. Udell of Oshawa); Lynn at home; and her beloved daughter-in-law, Judy, (Mrs. Wayne Whitney), and two sons, Wayne of Oshawa and Jamie at home. There are also four grandchildren, Marty Udell and Cheri, Christopher and Clayton Whitney.

A close friend of the family, the Rev. Arnold Herbert of St. John's Norway, Toronto, officiated at the funeral service at 11 a.m. Thursday, May 29, in the McEachnie Chapel. Pallbearers were Reg Whitney, Jerry Clemence, Max Waye, Billy Carruthers, George

McKenzie and Dave Collett. Interment was in Claremont Union Cemetery.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS TO DESTROY NOXIOUS WEEDS

Under the provisions of the Weed Control Act of the Province of Ontario Public Notice is hereby given to all owners and occupants of subdivided lands within the Town of Pickering that unless the noxious weeds or weed seeds on any such subdivided lands in the Town of Pickering are destroyed by Friday June 20th, 1975 and throughout the season the Council of the Town of Pickering has directed the Weed Inspectors for the Region of Durham to cause said noxious weeds or weed seeds to be destroyed in such a manner as they may deem proper, and that the expenses incurred by the said Weed Inspectors in the discharge of their duties shall be placed on the Collector's Roll of the Town of Pickering against the respective parcels concerned and that such amounts shall be collected in the same manner as taxes under the Municipal Act.

The co-operation of all citizens is earnestly solicited.

Mayor says taxes up \$49 in Pickering

PICKERING — The average Pickering taxpayer will pay \$49 more in taxes next year, according to information released by Mayor George Ashe last week.

The mayor said he was pleased with the size of the increase since earlier in the year they had anticipated a raise of about \$100. Comparison figures were based on a \$20,000 assessment.

The net regional levy will be up 12 per cent, while education taxes will rise 19 per cent from

the 1974 rate. According to Mr. Ashe, part of the relatively small increase in regional taxes is due to the taxable land tied up in the North Pickering and airport project properties. For those areas, the town is receiving "grants in lieu" of taxes.

One aspect that will remain the same as last year are municipal expenditures.

Levy by-laws for 1975 were passed by council after the executive committee meeting last week.
