## Uxbridge hesitates on pen

**UXBRIDGE** - This municipality's council is treading lightly but steadily in considering locating a federal penitentiary within its borders. At last week's meeting, council voted 4-1 to invite a penitentiary representative to discuss with council what the proposed reception centre would entail. Earlier, Scugog council had turned down a Federal Penitentiary Services request to locate the centre there after Scugog residents raised a storm of protest. Then, Uxbridge Councillor Bill Ballinger suggested that Uxbridge should consider locating the penitentiary there, saying it could be an asset to the community.

Councillors Joe Esmonde, Eleanor Todd and Bill Ballinger each indicated they had received strong phone calls concerning the penitentiary. It was Mrs. Todd's view that Mr. Ballinger had acted "unwisely" from a political point of view in encouraging consideration of Uxbridge as a site.

According to the motion passed, which was drafted by Mr. Ballinger, the requested meeting with Deputy Regional Director of the federal penitentiary services was for discussion purposes only. The word "discuss" was underlined in the draft of the motion.

Standing against the move to invite Mr. Bennett was Councillor Maustyn McKnight who said "you don't invite discussion unless you're interested in the project, and I'm not interested in the project."

Describing the penitentiary issue as "a very hot potato," councillor Eleanor Todd read a lengthy statement giving her reasons for supporting the Ballinger motion. While she wouldn't encourage having a penitentiary come, she said, she couldn't "in good conscience" object if Uxbridge had been proposed instead of Scugog. Nevertheless, she still would "bend to the wishes of the majority," regarding the issue, she said.

Mrs. Todd concluded by saying that the issue should be decided on the basis of "the facts" rather than "rumour and hearsay." "I don't have any facts. The Federal Penitentiary Services people do. Therefore I support the motion as presented," she concluded.

Mr. Ballinger told Mrs. Todd he resented the statement that he had acted unwisely, since he felt it was his duty as Planning and Development chairman to consider all possible development for the municipality. Mrs. Todd answered that she thought Mr. Ballinger was a fine councillor and might be "cutting his own throat" with the move.

## Baby contest at 1975 Markham Fair

**MARKHAM** - For the first time in many years there will be a baby show at the 1975 edition of Markham Fair. It will begin at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 11. There will be classes for both male and female infants and also for twins. Age groupings include - 3-6 months, 7-11 months, 12-15 months.

Something old, that will be new to many will be featured at this year's fair. Sheaves of grain, long made obsolete by modern combines, will be on display for Oats, Barley and Wheat. Sheaves on display must be 5-7 inches in diameter and should be obtained before the crop is ready to combine.

## Tenders called for building removal

**PICKERING** - Prospects for stopping the Pickering airport may have dimmed somewhat for its opponents last week.

The government began seeking tenders for the removal of buildings on the immediate construction site and Durham Region shied away from directly supporting Pickering's proposed court injunction to delay airport construction.

However, the time for the meeting between federal Transport Minister Jean Marchand and provincial Transportation Minister John Rhodes was set up, and will be July 29.

Mr. Rhodes said Mr. Marchand "may have a recommendation for us regarding funding." The province had announced that they weren't ready to commit the \$80 million necessary for the road infrastructure for the airport.

In Durham Region council, the management committee had recommended earlier that the region support in principle "Pickering's plan to seek an injunction to delay the airport until the infrastructure has been resolved and any road access has been constructed."

Most opposition to the motion resulted from the motion's wording. While saying council should support Pickering, it also says its support should be reviewed at a later time.

## Councillor speaks on penitentiary issue

**UXBRIDGE** - At last Thursday's meeting of council, Goodwood area Councillor Eleanor Todd presented a long and sometimes eloquent explanation of her stand with regard to locating a federal penitentiary reception centre in Uxbridge.

She prefaced her remarks by saying that she had always supported policies that will keep the community "green and rural" and that a penitentiary wouldn't necessarily be in conflict with that aim. It could provide "at least some jobs," she said, and would not be noisy, polluting, or unsightly. As to the danger involved, she said she was "in more danger venturing out into the summer weekend traffic" than she would be living next door to a maximum security prison.

"As a citizen I certainly would not actively encourage the erection of a penitentiary in my neighbourhood, but neither could I find any unselfish grounds with which to object to it if my community were selected as a suitable site," she went on.
