Musselman's Lake meeting

Garbage problems irk lake residents

BALLANTRAE — Problems with garbage pick-up, not a proposed official plan amendment, seem to be of concern to Musselman's Lake residents, if comment at a public meeting last week is any indication.

The meeting was called at the Ballantrae Community Centre to discuss the amendment which would designate the lake area Lakeside residential.

The area has been in a transitional zone for over two years, which has effectively frozen any new development there. The new designation would set out standards for new development, but would not affect buildings already there.

Town planner, Max Sherman, explained that the new designation was needed to deal with the current situation on the lake. Conversion of summer cottages to permanent homes has become an increasing problem, he said.

The amendment would set permanent home standards for all new dwellings to be built at the lake. The new designation will also be applied at Preston Lake.

About 70 people attended the meeting.

In reply to a question from Bill Waylen, planning board chairman Eldred King said that the amendment was needed to "provide protection for the present residents."

He said that anything built "from here on in, must conform and there will be no more summer cottages."

Mr. Waylen asked if taxes would increase as a result of the official plan change.

Mr. King replied that taxes are based on assessment and had nothing to do with the official plan.

"Those who want to build a cottage must do so of a more permanent nature," Mr. King said.

Later questions revealed concern with the zoning restrictions. Mr. Sherman said that the official plan amendment was not a zoning regulation.

"If it (a lot) is approved by the medical officer of health (for a septic tank permit), it will be approved under this amendment," Mr. Sherman added.

Brian Fitzsimmons of Valley Rd. asked if the town would be prepared to buy lots that could not be built on.

Mr. King did not say the town would buy the unseable lots, but added:

"I realize it would be a handicap for someone owning small lots in a low-lying area."

Mr. Fitzsimmons said that most lots on Valley Rd. are 50x100 feet and fail to meet health department regulations.

Shirley Feld asked if the amendment would influence sale of a cottage and Mr. King assured her it would not.

Under further questioning, Mr. King said that minimum lot sizes in the area for new homes would likely be 20,000 sq. feet, "the same as in a hamlet."

If a person can receive a septic tank permit, we will not discriminate.

"There isn't a lot that big on the lake," someone shouted from the back of the room.

Pearl Brissenden asked about the possibility of sewers in the lake area. Mr. King replied: "not in the near future."

A number of people complained about the garbage situation. One woman thought the bin located at the 9th Line was poorly placed and should be "in a less conspicuous place."

Others insisted that Monday pick-up in the lake area would solve the problem.

Mr. King replied that "everybody wants Monday pick-up."

As the meeting adjourned Ray Jones asked that a representative of the regional health department be invited to any meetings that will be called in the future to discuss zoning in the Musselman's Lake.

Markham dog show Aug. 23, 24

MARKHAM — While entries for the Markham Kennel Club Dog Show Aug. 23 and 24 come from all over Canada and the United States, they are also received from the Stouffville area.

The show is expected to attract 1,000 entries this year. It will be held at the Markham Arena (at the fairgrounds).

Thoroughbred dogs will compete for trophies and points with an overall champion declared for the two-day show. A dog must earn 10 points to earn the title of champion. Three judges evaluate the entries, according to breed, group and show in various classes including — Best Canadian Bred and All Best Canadian Bred Puppy.

Betty Devenport, one of the show organizers, said that Junior Handling is a very important class which this year will feature separate trophies for boys and girls.

"The Markham Kennel Club promotes this competition to encourage children to care for their dogs and show them," she said. "Everybody goes away with a prize — even if it's just a chocolate bar."

Trophies for the various classes have been donated by local merchants in the Markham and Stouffville area.

Stouffville area dogs entered this year amongst the 82 breeds are — Prince, a bulldog owned by Lloyd McIntee; Taiga, an Alaskan Malamute owned by Karen Middleton; as well as a Norwegian Elkhound owned by Mrs. Sawyer of R.R. 3, Stouffville.

The competition runs from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. each of the two days. Admissions is \$1 for adults and 25 cents for children.
