Mr. Tomlinson was born on Nov. 24, 1907, near Greenbank, the son of Lewis and Eva Tomlinson. He worked as an Industrial Arts teacher for 35 years, until his retirement four years ago.

He last taught in Weston. He married Alta Fockler on Aug. 3, 1955 and the couple lived in Weston until Mr. Tomlinson's retirement. They lived at R. R. 2, Stouffville. For many years Mr. Tomlinson also had a summer home in Greenbank. During World War II, he served as a Sargeant with the Canadian Army, being stationed at Chilliwack B.C.

Besides his wife, he leaves behind a sister Mrs. Louella Barker of Eldorado, Ont., and two nephews, Lea and Gurney Barker. Funeral was at O'Neill's Funeral Home with Rev. Roy Langford officiating. Burial was at Bethel Cemetery, Greenbank.

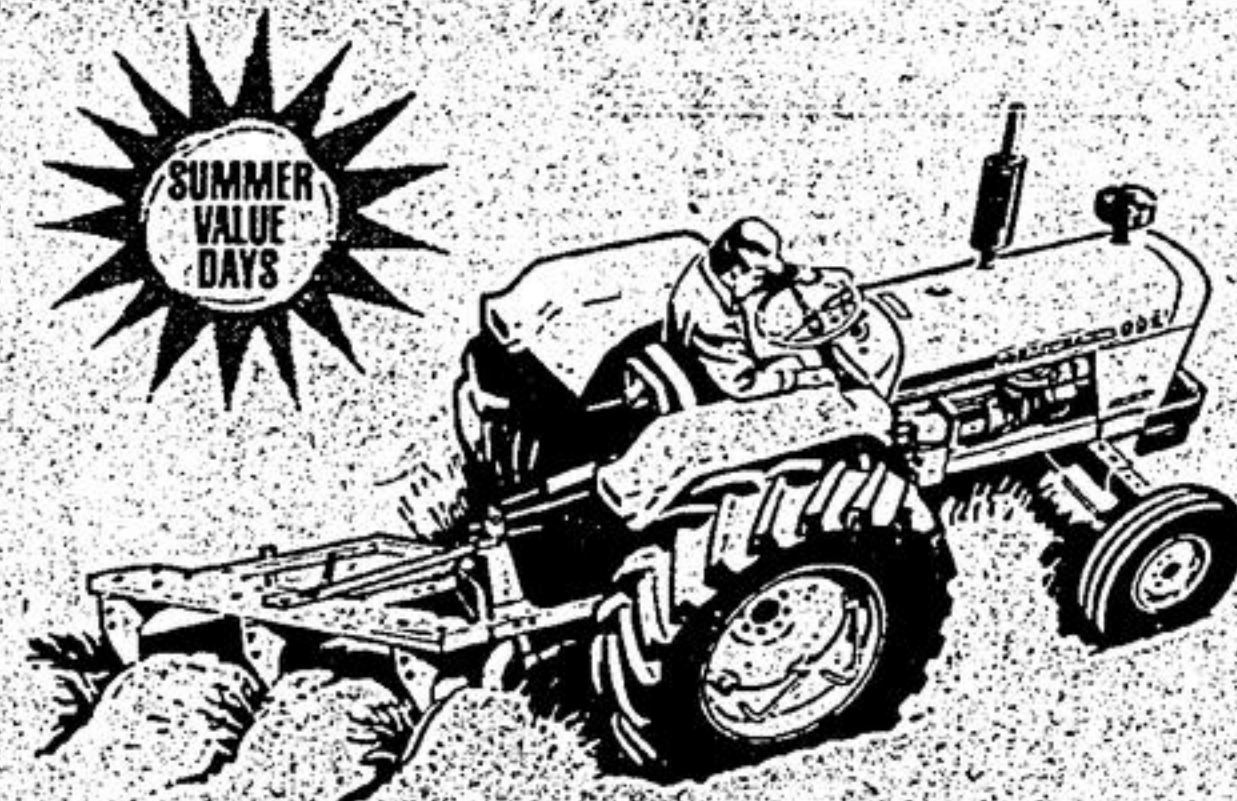
