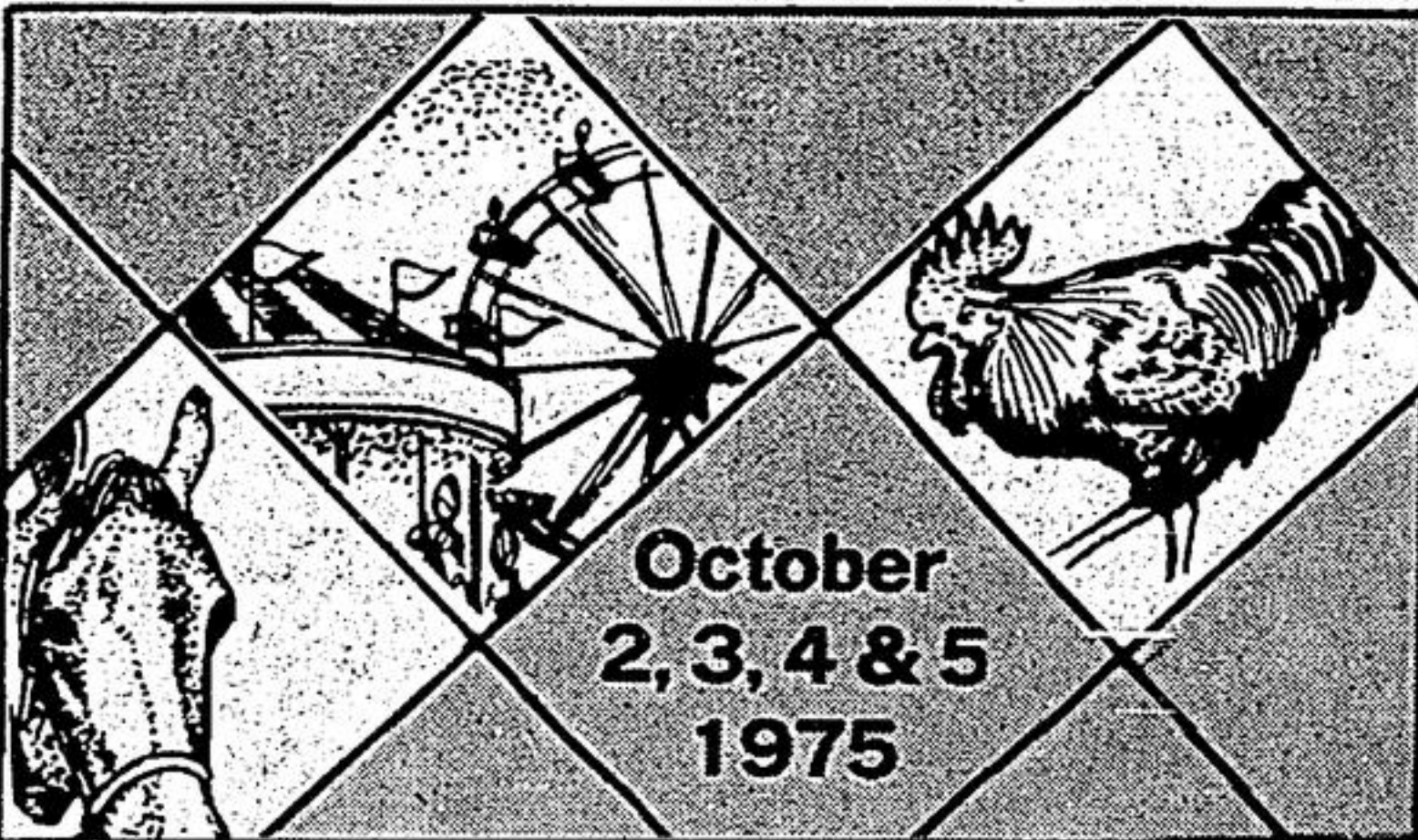


Pear in a mountain ash
