205 pounds, says he is "kind of looking forward to getting back there." Not much time is spent in Oklahoma City itself, he said, since much of the time they are "on the road."

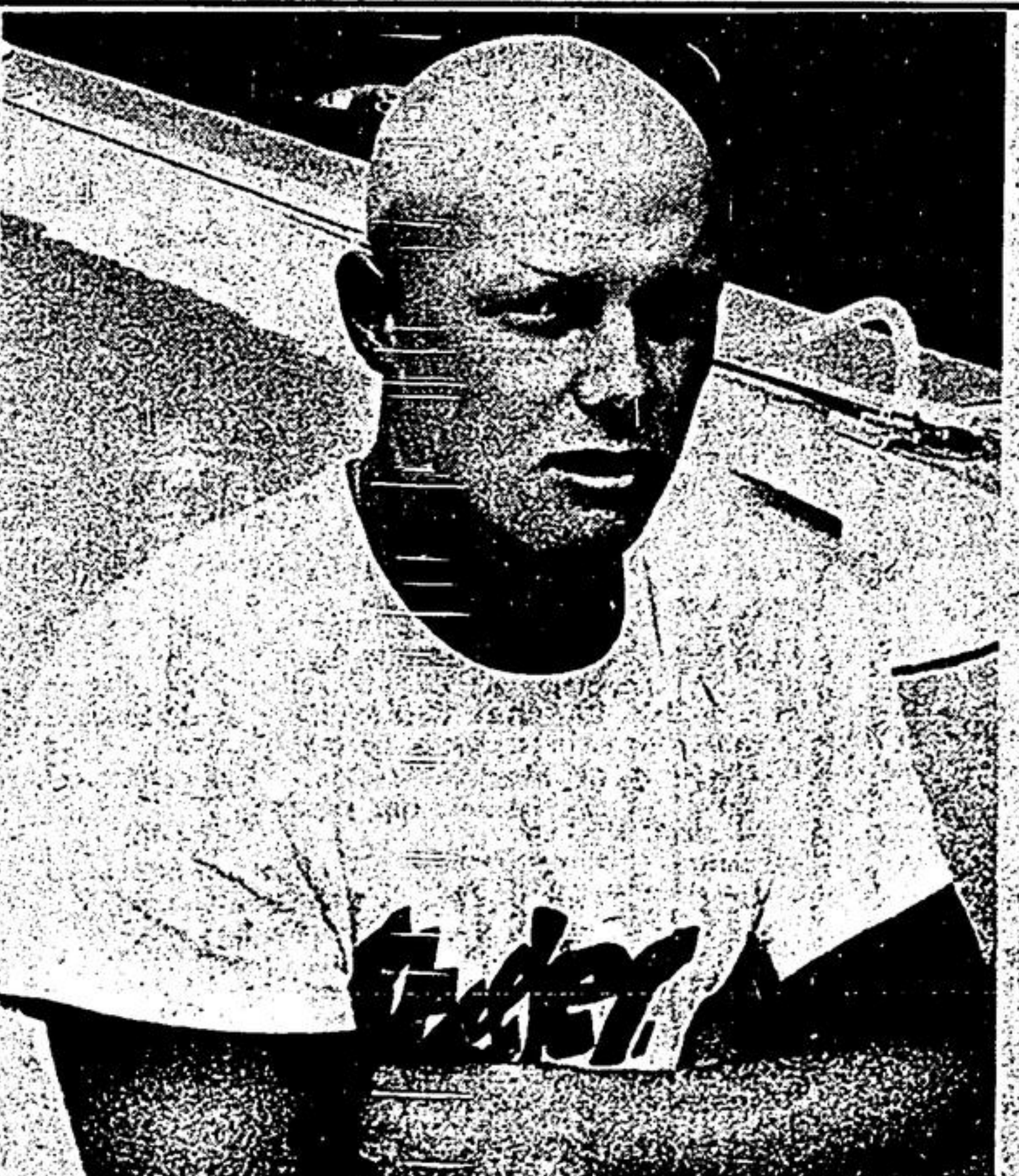
In Oklahoma City, press coverage of hockey takes a back seat to football, basketball or wrestling, Hassard said. It was the second year the sport was played there last season.
