Special board meeting on French

YORK CTY — Integration of French into as many of the York Region public school board's programs as possible will be discussed at a special board meeting Sept. 29. Trustees made the decision to hold the

special session following presentation of a 10-page report by a committee of five York Region teachers. Of the 13 recommendations contained in the report, eight were accepted and put into effect immediately, while the remainder — including the call for integration of French in Grades 1 to 8 — were tabled until the special meeting.

King trustee Margaret Coburn said Friday the proposal does not necessarily represent a move towards total bilingualism in the York public school system. "That would be too wonderful to imagine," she said. She added, however, that teachers appear willing to use French in more than just French classes. "I think the teachers do want transferring across," Mrs. Coburn explained.

Under the proposal presented to the board last month and forwarded to the special meeting, integrated French will be introduced in Grade 1 during the 1978-79 school year, with an additional grade added each year until the entire elementary school system is integrated in the 1985-86 school term. Under the recommendations accepted by the board, all teachers will follow a compulsory core vocabulary and structure designed to provide continuity. Courses of study for Grades 1, 2 and 5 were approved with trustees also accepting a recommendation calling for the preparation of audio-visual kits for use in all schools. A standardized form of evaluation will be

adopted with all instructors filling out questionnaires that will enable the teachers' committee to assess the program and recommend any necessary changes. During the upcoming special meeting, trustees will discuss recommendations for an annual series of workshops for primary French instructors.

Increased insulation saves money, energy

The amount and distribution of insulation in heated buildings, including the farm home, should be checked this summer to give you an opportunity to purchase additional insulating materials or make arrangements for installation while materials and contractors are available.

In some cases, redistribution of insulating material, particularly in the attic, can be a worthwhile effort at a relatively low cost, according to agricultural engineers with the Ministry of Agriculture and Food. Specific timing is critical for buildings housing livestock and poultry so that installation can be planned to avoid disruption of production schedules. With the cost of all forms of heat energy

increasing, it makes sense to invest in additional insulating materials. In most cases the cost of adding insulation will be recovered in one to five years. And, just as important, less fuel will be consumed. Fuel costs can also be cut by reducing unnecessary air infiltration and heat loss through windows. Seal unnecessary windows with removable insulated panels or double glazing. Double glazing can be accomplished very economically by using clear polyethylene available from hardware or building supply centers. Cracking around windows and doors can be sealed with caulking compound or weather stripping which are readily available and easily installed. Heat losses through windows are high. Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food extension personnel, Ontario Hydro customer service staff, building contractors and material suppliers are all available to offer assistance. Saving energy saves money and leaves more energy available for all of us next year.

Central office plan approves

DURHAM REGION — Suggestions for a consolidated, centrally located regional headquarters were accepted by Durham Region management committee last week. According to a report by chief administrative officer in Durham, Bill Manning, regional departments are already short of space and will experience greater shortages in the future. Three recommendations of the report were accepted by the committee. It said administrative offices for the region should be centrally located; that a site should be chosen soon and that an architect should be commissioned to design a suitable building plan.

Members of the management committee favor locating new headquarters in the existing headquarters site in Whitby.

At present, regional offices are located in three locations, with regional planning and public works departments at one location, social services at another and the headquarters at a third spot. The current set-up duplicates facilities and phone systems, the report said, and is inconvenient to people dealing with more than one regional department.
