In some areas Regional Gov. is better than administration at the local level, for instance, Health and Social Services, Family Services and I think the Police Force has generally been a good idea, although I know many people do not agree with me. 1. The extensive and expensive Queen's Park bureaucracy devours too much of the dollar. Also, there should be greater stress on community use of schools.

2. The N.D.P. would increase the general support by the province for school board expenditures from 60 percent to 80 percent.

3. The absence of enforceable prerequisites has weakened the credit system.

4. Some restraints are required but the present ceilings are unfair. Cutbacks at the classroom level have been greater than at the bureaucratic level when it should be the reverse.

5. Badly needed local needs have been postponed because of surpluses in other areas of the Region, e.g. Newmarket and Woodbridge high school additions.

9. I am told that this is so, the problem should be studied carefully.

11. The N.D.P. is committed to 116,000 housing starts a year. But these homes must not be located on our prime agricultural land.
