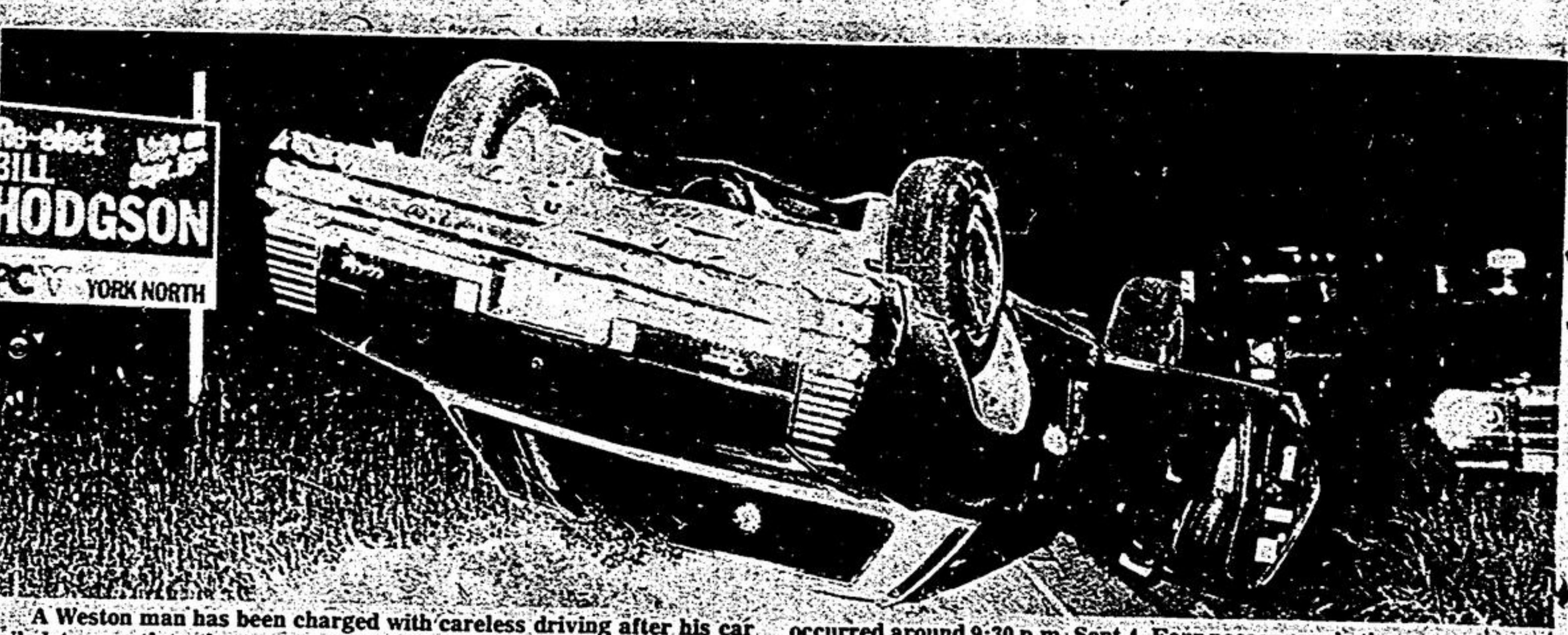

"History in Action" in Brougham Sat. & Sun. Sept. 13 & 14th

History in Action Demonstration day at museum

BROUGHAM — "History in Action" takes place Saturday and Sunday at the Pickering Museum, with pioneer crafts and early farm equipment being demonstrated.

The Brougham site will also be the scene of horse and buggy rides for children, and the sale of home baking and farmers' sausage, and souvenirs, refreshments and arts and crafts.

Admission to the event, which runs noon to 5:30 p.m. both days, is \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Demonstrations will include old steam tractors, steam engines, a miniature locomotive, dragaw, blacksmithing, wood splitting, a single mill, wood carving, chair caning, furniture making and repair, weaving, grain flailing, china painting, and a variety of other activities.

Fifteen display buildings are on the Brougham site, including an 1859 school, an 1830 log cabin, and a barn; a blacksmith shop, an 1853 church chapel, a plank house, a boardwalk house and various barns featuring collections of steam and gasoline engines.

The idea for the museum was formed in 1959 on the 100th anniversary of the brick schoolhouse, which is the main building of the museum. Robert Miller of Brougham, the current administrator, was instrumental in forming an historical committee which raised funds and supplied manpower in starting the museum.

Because of the location of the proposed Pickering airport, the museum is to be moved to a site in Greenwood, where it will be operated as a "living museum," if current plans are carried out.

The buildings and pioneer tools are considered to be one of the best such displays in Ontario. Administrator Miller is also author of a book on Brougham's history called "Brougham: Past! Present! Future?" The final chapter of the book deals with the Pickering airport which will virtually eliminate the village.

According to Mr. Miller, the original site has been purchased for \$2,500 for the museum, including one acre of land, the building and a well.

Whitby deaths up, Durham rate down

DURHAM REGION — Although the overall number of fatalities has decreased in the first six months of this year in Durham Region the Whitby Provincial of the Ontario Department of Police reported a slight increase.

The Whitby detachment, which had 10 deaths compared to nine last year, was the only detachment to report an increase.

In all of Durham Region there have been 22 deaths so far this year while in 1974 there were 29 deaths in the same period.

The number of fatalities has dropped every year for the past four years.

Const. Fred Carriere, Brechin community services officer, suggested, "There is no one specific reason for the decline. People may be more careful or are slowing down because of the gas prices — I don't know."
