Opens today

Golden Hands
Handicrafts

STOUFFVILLE — Today marks the Grand Opening of Golden Hands Handicrafts store, located in the Main Street store formerly occupied by Skid Robes.

Running the business will be Faith Lehman of Highway 48. Mrs. Lehman has been "retailing" in her home, and has been looking for a location for the store since January. She plans to sell mostly needlework

supplies, such as for macrame, crocheting needle point, crewel, and so on. Eventually she hopes to branch out into other crafts as well.

The store will also sell "crafts people have brought in," and will do crocheting and knitting "to order." Mrs. Lehman says she has several women lined up to fill orders.

Six-week lessons in knitting and crocheting

will also be held at the store.

Handmade baby clothes will be displayed in the store, but orders will be taken on adult clothing, she said. At the moment, Mrs. Lehman said she is working on "a full-length crocheted dress," that contains about \$75 worth of wool alone.

Free coffee and doughnuts will be served at the shop today during the grand opening.

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19th annual
pioneer festival
this Saturday

For the 19th consecutive year, Black Creek Pioneer Village is holding its Pioneer Festival. It is this coming Saturday.

The day-long event will feature pioneer demonstrations, home cooking of such items as sausage, chicken, pies, cookies, breads and preserves.

New and used goods will be offered for sale at a Bargain Emporium

together with interesting curios. An auction of hand-made quilts and a sale of hand-crafted items are also part of the festivities.

Pioneer Village is located at Jane St. and Steeles Ave. on the northern fringe of Metro.

School enrollments fluctuate

STOUFFVILLE — Although Grade 8 students are remaining at Dickson Hill and Ballantrae public schools this year, Stouffville Dist. Secondary School enrollment is up from 961 to 971.

The Grade 8 component is lower however. Last year S.D.S.S. had 190 Grade 8's in seven classes. This year there are 157 in six classes. The increase came in the secondary component which jumped from 771 to 814.

Although there are no new programs at the school, Vice-principal Robert Mercer, said that, for the first time, Grade 8 students from Dickson Hill and Ballantrae will be attending shop classes at the high school.

In terms of percentage, St. Mark's Separate School showed a dramatic upswing. The school has 219 students up about 20 over 1974. The school maximum is 230.

New programs at St. Mark's include full implementation of a metrics program from kindergarten to Grade 8, a new social studies program for grades 4-6; and a new religion course for grades 7 and 8.

Summitview Public School gained one student this year. The total enrollment for September is 404. A spokesman for the school said the total would likely increase over the school year as more people move into the College Park subdivision south of the school.

Orchard Park has seen a slight decrease. The 1975 total of 463 compared with 487 in September of 1974. Whitechurch - Highlands

has 300 students enrolled down from 319 last year. New programs at that school include a developmental guidance program.

School buses
now leave later

STOUFFVILLE — Later leaving time of buses from Stouffville Dist. Secondary School, which has drawn some adverse comment, will allow bus students to take part more fully in after-school activities, according to a spokesman.

Vice-principal Robert Mercer said that buses are leaving at 4 p.m. this fall. In previous years, the bus departure time was 3:30.

He said that "town students" had had all the

advantages in regards to involvement in extra-curricular activities.

Mr. Mercer stressed too, that students needing extra help from a teacher could receive that help between 3:30 and 4 p.m. and still be able to catch the bus.

Those serving detentions would be kept off the bus or be able to serve them at lunch time, he added, denying that the new bus leaving time was intended to make serving detentions easier.
