STOUFFVILLE — Funeral service was held at O'Neill's Funeral Home, Sept. 25 for Mrs. Guy Rutledge.

Mrs. Rutledge was born Blanche Rye at Holt in East Gwillimbury Township. She married Guy Rutledge of that same area on Sept. 14, 1921.

They farmed north of Newmarket for some time, before moving into that town. In 1947 Mr. Rutledge purchased the Maple Leaf Dairy in Stouffville and the couple moved to town the following year.

Mrs. Rutledge enjoyed helping out with the business and serving in the Dairy bar. They sold the dairy in 1961 and retired to a house on George St.

Mr. Rutledge passed away in 1972.

Music was a great joy to the Rutledges, and she was a faithful member of the Stouffville United Church and sang in the choir. She was a member of the Excelsior Club of Mount Albert.

Throughout her life, she enjoyed working around her house, especially in the garden.

She is survived by one daughter, Beulah (Mrs. Eldred King); sisters, Pearl (Mrs. Wes Wideman) of Stouffville, and Edna (Mrs. George Allison) of Uxbridge; a brother, Jack Rye of Sharon; and three grandsons — Jeffrey, Rodney and Jan King.

Rev. James Carder officiated at the funeral, with Mrs. James Oldham offering two solo numbers. Interment was Newmarket Cemetery.

CLAREMONT — Those people who don't believe in miracles will have a hard time convincing Mrs. Michael Valentino of Claremont.

Mrs. Valentino told of how she was miraculously healed during a service at one of the local churches.

In an interview with The Tribune, she related how she had been very ill for the past two years. It had been getting progressively worse. She had been in the hospital for tests in August.

The cause of her illness remained a mystery.

Mrs. Valentino said that it gotten so bad that she had lost her appetite and could not keep food down. Although she had considerable pain all the time, Mrs. Valentino said there would be times when she had, "very bad attacks".

She attended the service at Bethel Assembly of God in Ringwood, Sept. 21 and Rev. Howard Minaker laid hands on her and prayed with her after the service.

At that moment, Mrs. Valentino said she saw a vision "of the Lord over the altar".

"I didn't feel it (the healing) instantly," she said. "The next day I felt better and better."

"My appetite returned and I sat down to a meal for the first time in four weeks," she said.

She reports that none of the symptoms of her illness have returned since that day.
