### 'Celebration' brings conviction

MARKHAM — A Eakins who told the Court he works for Molson's Brewery, was found in a car stuck in a ditch by York Regional Police June 5. He was taken to York Regional Police Headquarters for a breathalyzer test. Counsel for the accused man told the court his client was on tranquilizers and should not have been drinking, but the birth of a new baby in the family seemed to indicate a celebration. "I don't mind you celebrating something like that as long as you do it at home," Judge Ian Munro told the Markham man, he added: "You could have killed someone by your actions."

Eakins was fined \$150 or 7 days in jail and his licence suspended under the Highway Traffic Act. Judge Munro refused to grant a provisional licence so the accused man could drive to and from work.



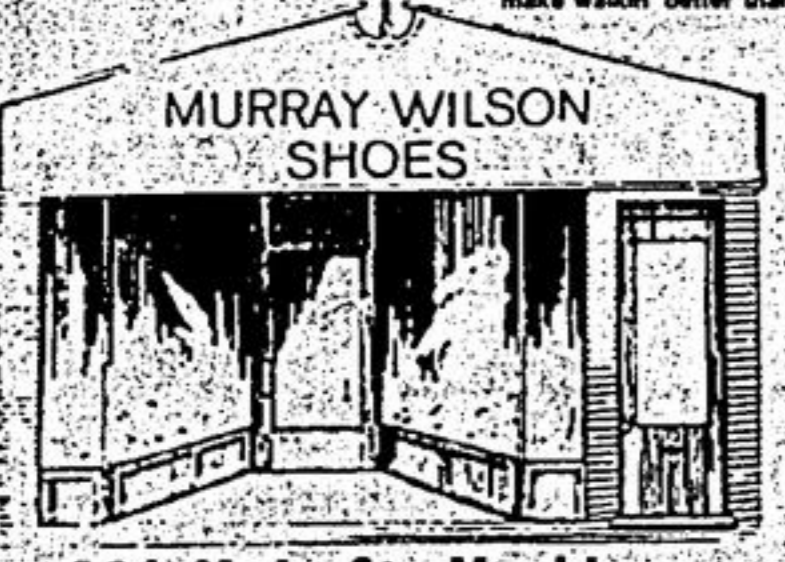

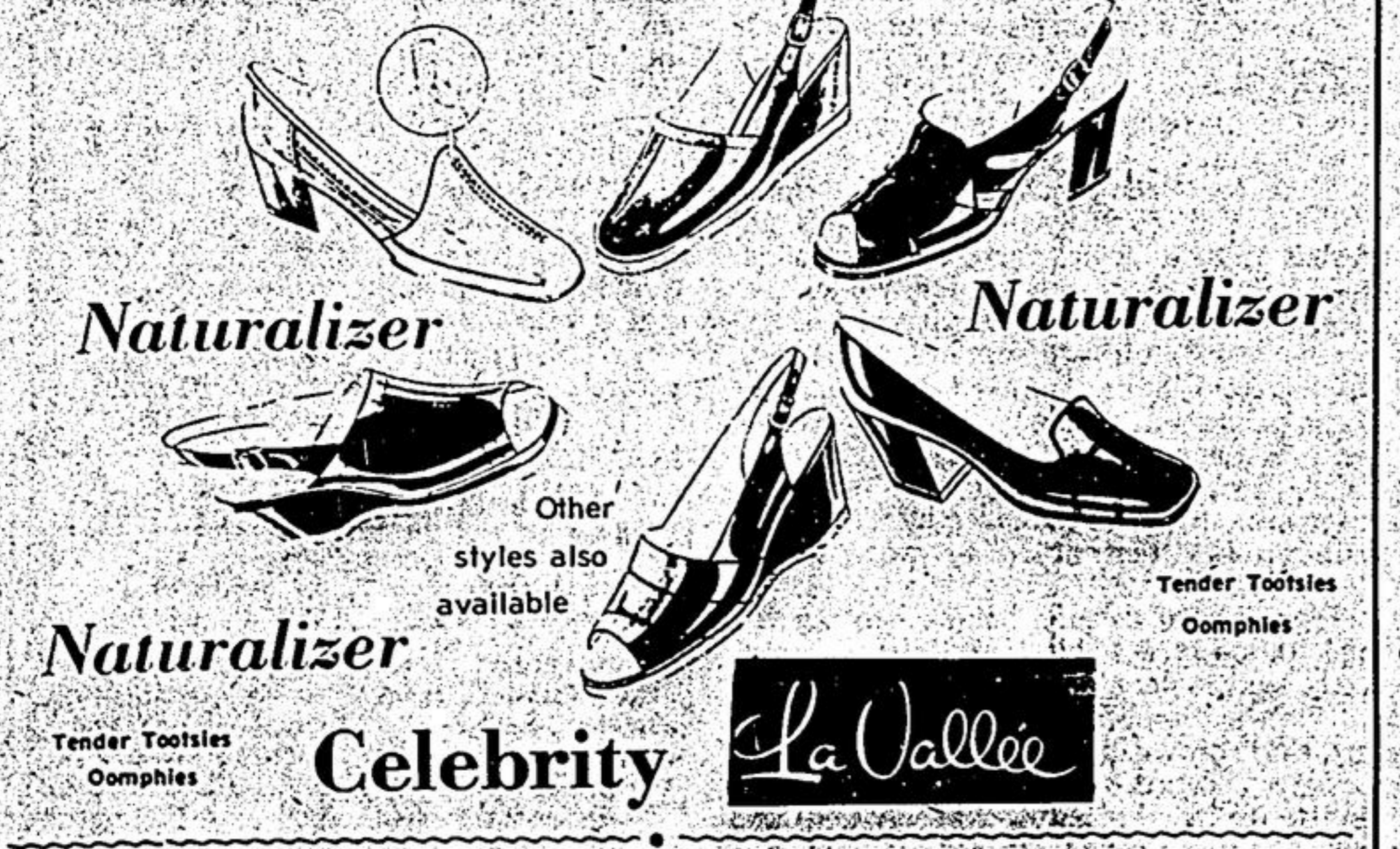

## Mix-up in scheduling Many refused at clinic

STOUFFVILLE — Many local people were unable to give blood at last Wednesday's Blood Donor Clinic as a result of a mix-up in scheduling. Regular donors were unable to give as last week's clinic was held 20 days too soon.

According to Area Supervisor for the Red Cross, Jim Butler, there must be a three month interval between blood donations and due to faulty scheduling the one in Stouffville was held too early.

"We owe them an apology," he said, "for the terrible inconvenience to the people who made the effort to attend and were turned down."

Mr. Butler asked The Tribune to convey his personal apology and he added that in future extra precautions will be taken to ensure the scheduling is accurate.

He said if the scheduling had only been off by a few days it wouldn't have mattered but 20 days was too much to ignore.

A good number of new donors saved the clinic from being a total disaster but it was far from a record. There were 107 registered but because of the three month interval requirement only 71 people were allowed to give blood.

### Further study for compulsory french

AURORA — Compulsory French programs for Grades 1 to 8 will not be introduced in York Region elementary schools, trustees decided here last month.

While narrowly defeating a motion that would have launched an integrated French program in a grade per year beginning with Grade 1 during the 1978-79 term, trustees approved further examination of a comprehensive French program.

The examination would include a study of the impact elementary school French programs have on French studies in secondary schools.

Rejection of the compulsory program came on a recorded vote after the board debated for more than two hours in open committee and a full board session.

### Police news Youths caught in road sign thefts

STOUFFVILLE — Following the arrest of two Newmarket youths York Regional Police received information that Kevin Fleet, 17, 9th line, was allegedly involved in the theft of six road signs. Fleet was arrested at his residence at 3:30 a.m., last Tuesday. The road signs have been recovered.

House fire — Whitchurch Stouffville Fire Department were called out Monday morning to a house fire at Lot 10, conc. 5. The house, the property of Hill 'N Dale Farms, caught fire as a result of a faulty clearout in the chimney. A smouldering basement beam cause approximately \$3,000 damage.

Housebreaking — The home of Rich Allan, Romfield Circuit, Thornhill, was entered through a basement window and \$2,893 in cash was stolen.

Obscene material — York Regional Police recently raided a stag at the Richville-Lion's Hall and seized obscene, films and a projector. Charged with exhibiting obscene material is Allan Thompson, 24, Woodward Ave., Thornhill. Police allege he sold tickets for \$10 which included a free bar and stag films.

Theft from locker — Two gym teachers at Markham and District High School are poorer but wiser this week. During the day someone entered the gym office and made off with the wallets of Edward Winacott and Christopher Van-Straten. The wallets, which were taken from lockers, contained altogether \$83, credit cards, personal papers and licences.
