TEMPORARY HELP REQUIRED —
TRAFFIC COUNTING

The Council of the Township of Uxbridge in co-operation with the Ministry of Transportation and Communications, is examining all local roads and streets for the purpose of developing future improvement programmes.

The determination of traffic volumes is an essential part of the Study. Because of the extent of the road and street system, traffic at a number of locations will be counted manually. Consequently, the assistance of residents is being sought. The details are as follows:

Period of Time required:
 About 7 hours in total; 2 hours for advance instruction and 5 hours for counting.

Dates:
 (a) instruction — Monday, October 20th, 1975.
 — Uxbridge Municipal Offices at 2 p.m.
 (b) counting
 — Tuesday, October 21st, 1975, 2:00-6 p.m.

Requirements:
 An insured vehicle to travel to count location, a valid driver's license and ability to count and record traffic with reasonable neatness on forms provided.

Compensation:
 A basic allowance of \$25.00 will be paid to all persons who assist. The allowance is compensation for time required for instruction, counting and the use of a vehicle.

Number required:
 Approximately 20 persons are required.

PINE ORCHARD
 An historic plaque commemorating the Whitchurch Quaker settlement will be unveiled Sunday, Oct. 26, at Pine Orchard Union Church.

It is one of a series being erected throughout the province by the Ontario Heritage Foundation.

The ceremony is being sponsored by the congregation of the Pine Orchard Union Church. David Summerfelt will be chairman of the program. Invitations have been extended to William Hodgson MPP, Sinclair Stevens MP and Whitchurch-Stouffville Mayor Gordon Ratcliff. Anthony Adamson will represent the heritage foundation.

Elma S. Starr, one of the few remaining members of the Society of Friends in the area, will unveil the plaque, which will be dedicated by Rev. Roy Inglis.

The Pine Orchard Union Church was the meeting place for one Quaker faction following its erection in 1830. The other group of Quakers used an older building which was subsequently moved to Aurora.

The Society of Friends sold the building to the Pine Orchard Union Church in 1945. The original burying ground is nearby.

The Pine Orchard Union Church is a union of three differing forms of the Society of Friends in Canada and began to function as a united congregation at the beginning of the 20th century.

Electric Power Planning

On July 17, 1975 Her Honour Pauline McGibbon, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario, approved an Order-In-Council establishing an independent commission under the chairmanship of Dr. Arthur Porter, to hold an inquiry pursuant to the provisions of the Public Inquiries Act into the long-range planning of Ontario's electrical power system.

The Commission has been instructed to examine the long-range electric power planning concepts of Ontario Hydro for the period 1983-1993 and beyond, to relate them to provincial planning, to the utilization of electrical energy and to environmental, energy and socio-economic factors, and to report on a priority basis on the need for certain Ontario Hydro projects presently under consideration.

To ensure that its reports will reflect the views of a representative cross-section of the people of Ontario, the Commission is anxious to meet at this early stage in a preliminary and informal fashion with as many persons, groups and organizations as possible.

Accordingly, the Commission has decided to hold a series of Preliminary Public Meetings around the province to inform the public of the Commission's activities, to encourage the public to participate in them and to invite comments and questions on the manner in which the Commission should conduct its inquiry. The Preliminary Public Meetings will be as informal as possible and will not involve the calling of evidence or cross-examination of witnesses. However, they will be followed in due course by appropriate public hearings during which there will be ample opportunity for concerned citizens to express their views on the many aspects of electric power planning which touch and concern every person in this province.

Preliminary and informal meetings will be held in the following areas. Locations and format of meetings in each area will be published in local papers.

London: Tuesday, October 28th and Wednesday, October 29th; Windsor: Thursday, October 30th; Sudbury: Monday, November 3rd and November 4th; Sault Ste. Marie: Wednesday, November 5th; Timmins: Thursday, November 6th; Toronto: Wednesday, November 12th and Thursday, November 13th; Ottawa: Monday, November 17th and Tuesday, November 18th; Cornwall: Wednesday, November 19th; Owen Sound: Monday, November 24th and Tuesday, November 25th; Wingham: Wednesday, November 26th; Hamilton: Monday, December 1st and Tuesday, December 2nd; Welland: Wednesday, December 3rd; Thunder Bay: Monday, December 8th and Tuesday, December 9th; Kenora: Wednesday, December 10th; Kingston: Monday, December 15th and Tuesday, December 16th; Peterborough: Wednesday, December 17th.

The Commission invites interested persons, groups and organizations to attend these Preliminary Public Meetings:

1. to learn about the terms of reference, objectives and implications of the Commission;
2. to discuss with the Commission a list of the issues, either general or local, which the Commission ought to consider; and
3. to discuss with the Commission the manner in which its inquiry ought to be carried out, the procedures, timing and location of the public hearings, the dissemination of information to the public and the use of this inquiry as a means of increasing the public awareness of the relationship between electric power and the quality of life in Ontario.

Because of the nature and purpose of the Preliminary Public Meetings, lengthy written submissions would not be appropriate but all persons, groups and organizations, particularly those who for any reason may not be able to attend the aforesaid Preliminary Public Meetings, are invited to submit their views on the above-mentioned matters briefly in writing by letter or other written communication delivered or mailed to the Commission not later than four days prior to a Meeting.
