In the first game, Scotty Brown led off the contest with a walk, and later scored. Minesing tied it in the 3rd, but Jim Chilvers put Stouffville in the lead again in the 4th with a home run.

In the bottom of the 4th however, Minesing bounced back to tie the score.

The seven regular innings ended in a 2-2 tie. The game was won in the 9th, on a series of Minesing hits to seal the contest.

On Sunday, Scotty Brown again walked on base in the bottom of the

first, followed by another base-on ball handed to Paul Barry. Dave Raymer then bunted on base, and Jim Chilvers lofted a long fly ball allowing Brown to score from third.

All of the Minesing scoring occurred in the next inning. Two errors, three stolen bases, a base hit and walk in that inning told the story as Minesing
