SDSS sweeps finals second year running

STOUFFVILLE — "We're a volleyball school and we're proud of it."

Stouffville Dist. Secondary School coach Jim Rehill had good reason for that statement as the SDSS boys' midget, junior and senior teams swept the York County finals for the second year running.

A large crowd turned out for the finals Saturday evening, in which Stouffville faced a

Woodbridge team on each level of competition.

The midgets won their best of three series 15-8, 15-5 while the juniors trounced the opposition 15-3, 15-4. The senior team romped over Woodbridge by 15-4 and 15-9 scores.

Rehill said he had expected the midget and junior games would have been closer than they were.

Through the day, 90 games were played at SDSS, with teams from

across the region competing. In each division, the two teams with the best records met in the finals.

The SDSS midgets entered the finals with a 10-0 record while Woodbridge was 6-4. The Stouffville juniors were 11-1, with their opposition standing at 9-3. As for the seniors, SDSS had racked up a 5-1 record, compared with 4-2 for Woodbridge.

The two schools —

SDSS and Woodbridge — together have captured 13 of the 15 possible York volleyball titles since the tournaments began in 1971. Including three titles this year and three last year, Stouffville has picked up nine of the trophies while Woodbridge won four over the years.

Coach Rehill places credit for this year's wins on, "a blend of experience, physical ability and hard work."

Three SDSS teams made it to the Georgian Bay Finals last year, but only the midgets came away with the title.

Coach Rehill expects the Stouffville teams are likely to make it into the finals again this year and has hopes that with a little change in strategy, might capture more than one GBSSA title this year.

Rehill also gives credit to the informal cheerleaders at Saturday's

Both senior games ended with Stouffville on top 15-4, 15-9.

It remains to be seen how the seniors will do in the G.B.S.S.A. tournament, particularly against a strong Orillia team. Sanderson predicts if we can establish a good block, I think we'll do all right."

Against Woodbridge, the seniors started game one slowly and after repeated changes of service the score was tied.

Then, David Lang began serving and didn't stop until the game had ended, Stouffville winning 15-4 with 11 consecutive points.

The last game of the night was somewhat closer, with Woodbridge closing the gap to end it 15-9.

Eugene Reesor was the dominant Stouffville spiker, with Mark Wideman, and Dwight Ewart blasting several good ones as well. It was Ewart's first year playing high school volleyball.

Other team members performed their respective tasks with precision as well in two games played flat-out and "with feeling."

Girls' and boys' softball executives join up locally

STOUFFVILLE — The boys' and girls' softball organizations in Whitchurch-Stouffville have been amalgamated under one head and will operate now as the Whitchurch-Stouffville Softball Association.

The move came on a recommendation from Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Committee.

New president of the organization is Norm Ewing, with Cliff Dunkeld vice-president.

In the view of recreation committee member Becky Wedley, "the new set-up bringing everyone together will make for a much stronger and better organized association."

proximately 75 runners, but fell coming down one of the hills on the Collingwood Blue Mountain course. Fockler recovered but ended up 10th. Other places for Stouffville were Joe Thistel (27th), Keith Manser (28th), and Tom Conway (29th). The senior boys finished fourth out of 12 teams.

The midget girls again found the competition stiff, finishing 7th out of 14 teams. Completing the race for SDSS were: Deona Jordan, Karen Edmison, Sandy McLeod and Laurie Brillinger.

Misfortune also befell the junior boys as Matt Crane dropped out of his spot in third place when his knee gave out. Other SDSS runners were: Duncan Manser (14th), Mark Helliwell (19th) and Don Turner (64th).

Clipper team trounced 8-3

STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville Clippers bowed to the poise and experience of Lindsay Muskies on Saturday

night, losing the first encounter with last year's OHA Finalists by an 8-3 decision. It was the Clippers' second loss in three nights after coming up short in their second meeting with Port Perry 4-3.

Lindsay showed a lot of poise in their win, taking advantage of a number of Clipper mistakes in the early going. In the opening minute of play, Muskies captain, Kevin Graham jumped on an errant clearing pass by the locals and drilled a waist high shot on Jack Holder that slipped in off the

The visitors were called several times on their use of hands in the contest, something which may have shaken their confidence.

In the second game, SDSS moved ahead early, taking a 9-1 lead after seven consecutive Dave Rehill serves. Brad Steel drilled two good spikes for points through that series. The Stouffville defence slipped only slightly through the remainder of the game as they came out on top 15-5.

Most consistent in the spiking department for the midgets was Nick Bangay, with Chris Kamps and Indie Persaud delivering superb sets.

Rehill emphasized he didn't want to single out any one player since it was an overall team victory.
