Farm report

More forms to complete

Paperwork gets into farming more and more. Organized marketing and government plans to stabilize incomes, un-

fortunately, both result in more forms to fill out, and rules to get straight. It's all quite necessary, but a little hard because often interest in paperwork is not complementary to in-

terest in, and ability to run a farm well.

There are two jobs of this kind now. One is to apply for the Beef Stabilization payment. This applies to all grade A, B or C cattle sold for slaughter from Aug. 12, 1974 to Aug. 11, 1975. The payment is 48 cents a hundred, or about \$5 per animal. It would be a lot simpler if the price on the market could be kept up by half a cent, but that just can't be done on the open market system.

The support price set for the year was 45.42, the average turned out to be 44.94 so the payment is 48 cents.

Producers can get the application forms at our office, and submit them along with packing plant invoices for the cattle sold, or statements from

buyers verifying that the cattle were slaughtered. Those who sell direct to consumers need abattoir receipts and bills to buyers.

Cows sold from Nov. 16 to April 30 are still eligible under a separate program, and we have these forms, as well.

The new federal excise tax on gasoline brings on another paper job. All businesses, including farmers, can get this tax — 10 cents a gallon since June 24 — refunded at the end of the year.

Forms can be picked up at post offices, and claims can be made twice a year — Dec. 30 and June 30. Receipts do not have to be submitted, but some proof of purchase should be kept with farm records.

Despite new headquarters

Space a premium: trustee

THORNHILL — Despite construction of a multi-million dollar administrative complex in Aurora, the York County Board of Education could face overcrowding of its headquarters within five years, a trustee charged here, Sunday night.

John Stephens said the project, which will cost \$2.5 million with interest charges, was launched to enable the board to escape from its over-crowded headquarters on Church St. in Aurora.

"We've gone this route to get out of the building on Church St. but I can see in the future that building becoming an annex," he warned.

Asked how long it will be before the board moves back into the building it is now planning to vacate, Mr. Stephens replied, "I'd say within five years."

Mr. Stephens, chairman of a committee

examining proposals for restructuring of the board, made his comments during a newspaper interview at his home.

"The new building is too small to stand 20 to 30 extra people," said Mr. Stephens.

Discovery of the situation came as Mr. Stephens' committee examined proposals relating to area offices.

During a session at Thornlea Secondary school two weeks ago, "it struck home how tight the planning was," said Mr. Stephens.

He quoted board finance and administration superintendent George Ford as saying 20 to 30 people could be accommodated "cheek to jowl."

Mr. Ford said the building was planned on a basic assumption of "zero expansion," Mr. Stephens reported.

The issue of ex-

panded facilities arose as the committee discussed the possibility of relocating area office functions in the headquarters building.

The committee, the chairman said, was unable to co-ordinate its efforts with the plans for the building.

"The lack of co-ordination between the two has produced nothing more than the status quo," he explained.

In a recommendation

that will go to the board Nov. 10, the committee will call for four area offices with no changes in the northern half of the region, but realignment to Richmond Hill, Vaughan and Markham Thornhill groupings in the south.

Under the recommendation, area offices will continue to be located away from board headquarters.

Mr. Stephens and board chairman Don Sim

cast dissenting votes in the 3-2 report.

While he was prepared to issue a minority report, the committee chairman said Sunday, "I've thrown in the towel on it."

Location of the area offices, "is completely out of trustees hands," he said.

"The trustees in fact have no choice," Mr. Stephens noted. "The area offices are generally going to stay where they are."

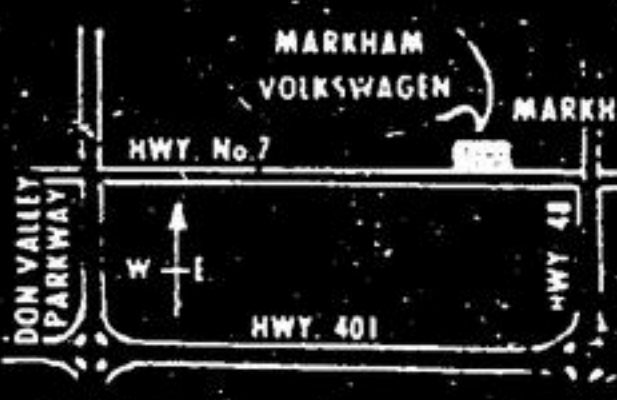
