Christian school meeting

Family is education centre

STOUFFVILLE — Education should move out of the hands of the state and into the hands of the parents, a meeting of potential supporters of a Christian School in Stouffville were told last Thursday.

Main speaker to the group, which met at the Stouffville Missionary Church, was Dr. Daniel Edminson of The People's Church, Toronto. The People's Church itself operates a highly successful Christian school.

"God gave responsibility for education to the family," Dr. Edminson said. "That has never been relinquished by God."

A group of about 50 also heard reports on the formation of sub-committees for the school, on proposed dress codes and on a doctrinal basis for the school.

According to interim steering committee chairman David Barker, interested parties are being asked to fill out questionnaires indicating whether they want to send children to the school or would like to help on one of the sub-committees.

Sub-committees currently being formed include transportation, educational, public relations, finance and building committees.

The target date for opening a Christian school in Stouffville now stands at September, 1976. The school would be designed to serve children in about a 15-mile radius of Stouffville.

Mr. Barker told The Tribune a "formational meeting" for a parents' association for the school would be held soon.

In his speech, Dr. Edminson told the group that Christian schools are very much on the increase in North America, with 100 coming into being yearly in the U.S.

He argued that "as the classroom goes, so goes the nation," and that

Other topics would be left up to the individual churches to teach, he said.

Mr. Barker added that "a Christian school is not there to major in on doctrine but to present academic subjects from a Christian point of view."

Dr. Edminson asserted that "secularism has become the religion" in public education and that modern education founders Horace Mann and John Dewey were, respectively, a Unitarian and "an outspoken atheist."

He attacked both "progressive" and "open" education, saying a more structured system was needed.

As to the argument that a Christian school would be "sheltering them in an unreal atmosphere," Dr. Edminson said "I agree that we are and I say that we should."

He said that three hours a week in a "Bible-believing church," was "not enough to train our young people to meet a world that's far away from God and going further away."

After the address, steering committee member Rev. Paul Hope of Churchill Baptist Church told the group that doctrinally, the school would emphasize "those things we can agree on that are very clear."
