

Clippers come together for win

STOUFFVILLE — Led by the strong goaltending of Rick Marshman and the heady play of Doug Taylor and Craig Waite, the Stouffville Clippers finally put it together as a team Saturday night in defeating their Junior C rivals from Port Hope 8-2.

Many local followers had been critical of Clipper play, especially after their 8-3 loss to Lindsay. But those critics in attendance Saturday were soon silenced by Stouffville's fine display of team unity and cohesion.

Centreman Taylor and his rightwing linemate Peter Fitzpatrick gave Stouffville a quick 2-0 first-period lead. Port Hope's Sweeney cut that lead to one early in the second period but

from then on it was all Stouffville. Five unanswered goals put the game on ice for Stouffville.

Kevin Barrick, recently returned to the Clipper lineup following a painful shoulder injury, scored the third Clipper

goal on a power-play set-up by captain Wayne Norton and Dave Mumford. Doug Taylor's second of the night and a tally by Brad Hunt rounded out the second period scoring.

Stouffville opened the third period with a surge.

Craig Waite, scoring a short handed goal from Wayne Norton while Mike Wightman was off for elbowing, Wightman was back on the ice for just fourteen seconds when he notched the seventh Clipper goal from linemates Taylor and Fitzpatrick.
