13-5 vote

Trustees reject student lottery to raise funds

YORK CTY. — Newmarket High School's student council was turned down last week in a bid to stage a fund-raising lottery.

Trustees rejected the proposal on a 13-5 recorded vote about two hours after council representatives said an additional \$2,800 was needed above funds raised through the sale of student cards.

The money, said council president Chris Jackson would go towards school teams, dances, social activities, community charities, and the foster child sponsored by the council. Programs within the school would also benefit, Mr. Jackson explained.

"Each club required a certain amount of money," he said.

The additional \$2,800 would enable the council to operate on a budget similar to previous years with no allowance for inflation, trustees were told.

A deficit from the previous year's council increased the pressure on the current group, said the president.

"We were left paying some of the bills from last year," Mr. Jackson noted.

But Markham trustee Gary Adamson termed it "amazing" that the students would need a budget that would total with current funds and projected lottery income, would total close to \$5,000.

In opposing the move, Mr. Adamson said residents throughout the region have been plagued by fund-raising campaigns.

"The homeowner sort of dreads the knock on the door," he noted. "It's about time we took a stand that education is not for money raising."

Georgina's Bill Laird blasted some of his fellow trustees for the attitude in dealing with the students.

Speaking in favor of the motion, he said the rejection of the lottery would kill the incentive on the part of students.

Students, he said, are criticized for being lazy and apathetic but when they do develop a valuable proposal, trustees "knock them and kick them."

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
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
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
