## Disposal study says four sites needed

YORK REGION — Four new land fill sites will be needed in York Region by the year 2,000 to handle garbage generated within the region, a waste management study reveals.

The report states that the 156,000 tons of garbage annually created in the region will soar to one million tons by the end of the century.

The region's population is about 200,000. By the year 2000 it would be as high as 750,000. Garbage output was estimated on a middle population figure.

The report stated that four new landfill sites will be needed. They would be located in Markham, Vaughan, Newmarket and if needed, Georgina Township.

The report recommends that the region own, control and operate solid waste disposal facilities, but that collection haulage remain at the local level.

To cut the waste, the report supports construction of a reclamation plant in Richmond Hill area with a capacity of 1,000 tons per day.

The plant might eliminate the need for one of the landfill sites in the southern part of the region.
