STOUFFVILLE Junior "C" hockey is alive and well in Stouffville: just ask anyone who attended the game between the Clippers and Lindsay last Saturday night. The Ken May Real Estate squad, under the direction of Don McBeth and Ken Roberts, played their finest game of the season to date defeating the league-leading Lindsay club 6-3.

Unlike the Lindsay-Stouffville encounter two weeks previously, the Clippers controlled the play from the outset, checking tenaciously and capitalizing on most of their scoring opportunities.
