Commission approves 23 YRP staff promotions

YORK REGION — The York Regional Board of Police Commissioners last week gave approval for the promotion of 23 officers effective Nov. 10.

One member of the Commission, at least expressed surprise at the number of officers involved. King Commissioner and Board Vice President Gordon Cook told the Board, "I'm caught by surprise at such a long list, it makes me wonder how many superiors we have to the number of workers."

The King Township Commissioner was referring to the promotion of Inspector Donald Hillock to the rank of staff inspector in charge of the Criminal Investigation Branch, and to Detective Sergeant Clifford Cox to the rank of Inspector of the Criminal Division Branch No. 2

District Headquarters in Richmond Hill.

Police Chief Bruce Crawford told the Board that the appointments have been made necessary by the combination of services in the southern area and told the Board Staff Inspector Hillock will now be in charge of both areas in the C.I.B.

Chief Crawford said the opening of the new headquarters in Richmond Hill next month will bring together detectives serving in three areas.

On question from Mr. Twinney of Newmarket, Chief Crawford said promotions within the Detective Branch of the Force bring the bureau up to approximately 30 in strength, allowing for regular 7 day working weeks.

Mr. Twinney told the Board he was glad to learn that the detective bureau would now have a full complement which would eliminate officers working long overtime hours.

Chief Crawford told the Board that the force is not top heavy with supervisory officers.
